During the year 1906 there were 70 leases issued by the board covering 72,850.64 acres of land. Six applicants for leases were denied and 11 are still pending. There remains under various grants to the state a total of 16,753.75 acres yet to be selected by the board. The selections approved since statehood amount to 1,255,591.62 acres. During the year just passed 7,771.68 acres of land were sold by the board and 15,066.18 acres were offered at pub-lic auction. The board has invested for the funds of the various state in-stitutions the total sum of 1,472,237.17.

Demonstration on Rollers Accompanied by a Lecture on Gravitation.

WIFEBEATER GETS 30 DAYS.

Stood Trembling and Sniveling When He Received His Sentence.

William Whiting, the man arrested a few days ago for beating and otherwise ill treating his aged and infirm wife,

Ill treating his aged and infirm wife, and who whined in court that he so loved his wife that he provided food for her once in awhile, and that if he beat her and so hurt her that she had to lay in bed for several days and de-pend upon the charity of kind hearted neighbors, will not have a chance to matreat the woman again, at least not for thirty days. When Whiting stood trembling and sinveling before Judge Diehl for sen-tence, the court had something to say. "If it were not for the apparent fact that you have helped your wife some, and have provided for her to some ex-tent, and for the further fact that she is dependent upon you for what little assistance she receives, I would im-pose the most severe sentence the law allows. I feel that some punishment must be imposed, but for the reasons stated I will not be severe." Judge Diehl then sent the man to jail for thirty days.

"Doctor" James Donaldson was arraigned before Judge Aumstrong in the oriminal division of the district court today upon the charges of grand larceny and robbery and without any further time entered a plea of not guilty to the charges. Donaldson is charged with fleecing the McWhirter brothers out of \$2,000 in a poker game on Sept. 19 last and with being implicated in the gang that robbed the men of \$8,373. The men were enticed into a room on west Second South street where Donaldson and his associates robbed them aldson and his associates robbed them of the total sum of \$10,373. Donaldson was arrested at Hot Springs, Ark., but the other members of the gang have not been located as yet. Donaldson is now at liberty on bail and his case has been continued for the present setting of cases made by Judge Armstrong on Monday. He was represented in court today by Atty. S. A. King.
