### CONGRESSIONAL.

#### SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 9.—By unanimous consent the House bill abolishing the District of Columbia Police Commissioners, and to transfer the duties to the District Commissioners was passed.

The resolution, ordering the arrest of the recusant witness Runyon, passed without division.

Wallace's resolution concerning the electoral count was then considered.

Sherman spoke at length, and claimed that the evidence before the Louisiana returning board justified their action.

WASHINGTON, 12.—At the conclusion of Booth's remarks consideration was resumed of the bill to perfect the revision of the statutes of the United States.

The resolution by Thurman was agreed to, instructing the committee on revision of the laws to inquire into the propriety of publishing a new edition of the Revised Statutes with the laws passed since 1873, the articles of confederation and the federal constitution.

#### HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 8.

Hunter introduced a bill to authorize and equip an expedition to the north seas. It authorizes the President to organize and send out one or more expeditions towards the north pole, and to establish a temporary colony, for purposes of exploration, at some point north of the 81st degree of north latitude, on or near the shore of Lady Franklin Bay; to detail officers or other persons in the public service to take part in the same, and to use any public vessel that may be suitable for the purpose, the scientific operations of the expedition to be prosecuted in accordance with the advice of the national academy for the purpose. Referred to the committee on naval affairs.

A bill to abolish the District of Columbia police commissioners and transferring their duties to the district commissioners, passed by a unanimous vote.

Kasson offered a resolution instructing the select committee on the privileges of the House, in regard to counting the electoral votes, to inquire whether any electoral votes were cast by persons laboring under political disabilities, and if so what action should be taken thereon; adopted.

WASHINGTON, 9.—The Speaker presented Morrison's communication on Louisiana affairs and Orton's refusal to appear before the committee.

The resolution for the arrest of Orton passed.

WASHINGTON, 9.

The following bills were introduced:

By Willard, to regulate the final survey of the public lands of the United States.

By Piper, to continue in force the law quieting land titles in California.

By Page, to permit homestead settlers within the R. R. limits to enter into certain cases additional lands.

By Goodin, of Kansas, to secure the rights of settlers on railroad lands.

O'Brien, of Maryland, objected. Durham, from the committee on

revision of laws, reported back the Senate bill to correct the statute punishing counterfeiters, requiring intent to be shown. Passed.

WASHINGTON, 11.—Holman's amendment to the consular appropriation bill decreasing the salaries, was defeated—100 to 59.

The military academy appropriation bill passed with amendments.

WASHINGTON, 11.—The military academy bill was passed without amendment. It appropriates \$265,000; \$130,000 less than the estimates, and \$25,000 less than last year. The saving is principally in longevity allowances.

The bill providing remedies for overcharge of duties on tonnage and imports, passed.

WASHINGTON, 12.—Knott, of the Judiciary committee, in the case of the recusant witness Barnes, reported that the House had the right to compel the production of the telegrams by the telegraph companies' officers. Barnes was brought before the House and declared that he is not now manager of the New Orleans office, but that should be again be placed in charge of it he would willingly produce any telegrams demanded of him.

Knott offered a resolution declaring that the response of the witness was not sufficient, and remanding him to the custody of the Sergeant-at-arms until he shall have produced the telegrams or been discharged by the order of the House. Adopted 131 to 72.

Knott, from the House committee on the electoral count, reported, recommending the adoption of the following resolutions:

First—That the constitution of the United States does not confer on the President of the Senate power to examine and ascertain the votes to be counted as electoral votes for President and Vice President.

Second—That the only power which the Constitution confers on the President of the Senate, in regard to the electoral votes for President and Vice-President, is to receive the sealed lists transmitted to him by the several electors' clerks, to keep the same safe, and to open all certificates, or those purporting to be such, in presence of the Senate and House of Representatives.

Third—The Constitution does confer on the Senate and House of Representatives power to examine and ascertain the votes to be counted as electoral votes.

Fourth—In the execution of that power, in respect to counting the electoral votes, the House has at least equal power with the Senate.

Fifth—That in the counting of the electoral votes, no vote can be counted against the judgment and determination of the House.

Sixth—That the committee have leave to sit again and report here after further matter for the consideration of the House.

Knott asked that two additional members be appointed on the committee to ascertain the rights and privileges of the House in counting the electoral vote.

The Speaker appointed Field and Lawrence members of that committee.

### AMERICAN.

NEW YORK, 13.

The Tribune's editorial says the unexpected has happened again as usual. Just as Grant seemed to have put away partisan considerations from his public acts, and was winning by his private bearing the respect and admiration of the men who have criticized him most severely, and even of those who have maligned him, he smears over the whole picture, and with one sweep of his pen, he has placed Murtagh again at the head of the Washington police board, although that gentleman is resting now under the charge of having concocted a vile conspiracy against the reputation of a member of Congress, and although Congress sent to the President, only three days ago, a bill abolishing the board, which both Houses had unanimously passed, to get rid of Murtagh. If the latter were ready to show himself an innocent man Grant might seem more excusable, but Murtagh's attorney spent the whole of yesterday trying to establish, not his client's blamelessness, but his accuser's inefficiency as chief of police. After this there is no telling when Boss Shepherd may be appointed Minister to France or Mullett sent abroad to enrich the language of courts with his picturesque profanity. To

put it mildly, this action is characteristic.

The World's Washington special says a compromise is now probable in Louisiana whereby Nicholls will be governor, Casey senator, and Pinchback collector.

The World's New Orleans special says the names of Warmoth, Pinchback, Casey, Judge Wiley and other Hayes men are among those who declare that Nicholls is elected and recognize his government.
