LOCAL BRIEFS.

Inspection at Strawberry—State Veterinarian A. C. Young goes to Strawberry valley tomorrow to inspect the sheep there. He urges the hearty cooperation of the sheepmen in eradication of disease.

Good Roads in Granite—The county commissioners and Road Supervisor Willard Shaw inspected the county roads yesterday afternoon. It was decided to spend \$5,000 for improvements in the Granite district this fall.

To Visit Bingham—The Utah Press association will spend Monday, Sept. 27, at Bingham, as guests of the Bingham Commercial club. The train will leave Salt Lake at 3 p. m. and return at 5:45 p. m. Arrangements have been made for a trip through some of the mines of the famous camp.

Ad. Club Meets Next Week—The Salt Lake Ad. club will resume its meetings for the season next Tuesday evening, when Prof. N. H. Nesbit is to lecture on the "Psychology of Advertising." A feature will be also "The President's Question Box." The first annual banquet is set for January next, for which a program is being prepared.

Kindergarten Opened—The Free Kindergarten, which is supported by a number of philanthropic women of Salt Lake City, was opened yesterday at 432 South Fourth street, with Miss Nellie Sherman in charge. The enrollment yesterday was 19, though within the next week or two the enrollment is expected to reach 40 children, which is the number the school will accommodate.

Few Sheep Infected—Chief Murray of the bureau of animal industry has returned from Heber, where he found that out of 1,800 sheep there was only 1 per cent affected with the dread disease and its danger. He does not think there is any occasion to become hysterical over the matter, but it is necessary to eradicate what has appeared, and to guard carefully against further infection. The disease is of a gangrenous character with suppuration as a feature. The sheep have such sore mouths that they cannot feed, and starve to death.

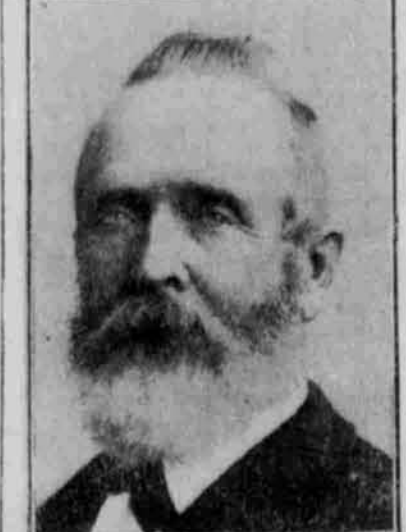
The Mann Temple will close Friday evening, Oct. 1, and reopen Tuesday morning, Oct. 5, at 10 o'clock.

ANOTHER PIONEER ANSWERS LAST CALL

John D. Holladay, Who Came to Utah In 1847, Dies at Santaquin.

Another 1847 pioneer passed away in the person of John D. Holladay, who died Sept. 16, at Santaquin, Utah county, at the age of 82 years. He came to Utah in 1847 but soon afterwards went back to Alabama, his native state, to settle on a estate. He returned the following year and has ever since been identified with the building up of the state.

He settled about 10 miles south of Salt Lake City when he first came to the valley, the place called Holladay.

Being named after him. In 1851 he went to San Bernardino, California, for the purpose of assisting in colonizing that place. Associated with him in that move were his father, C. C. Rich, and Amasa Lyman. While there he was made county sheriff. In 1860 he returned to Utah, locating at Santaquin, where he has resided ever since. At one time he was deputy sheriff of Utah county, and he also served as guard at the state prison for a number of years. He took an active part in the troubles with the Indians in the early days, and was a captain of militia in the Black Hawk war. He was one of the first settlers to go on a mission after the civil war, crossing the plains for this purpose in 1866. He also made one trip across the plains for the purpose of bringing in a company of immigrants from the Missouri river. He was also a delegate to the first state convention in 1895.

In addition to those named, Mr. Holladay held ecclesiastical positions of trust, such as bishop, high counselor, etc. Although engaged principally in farming, he has been active in railroad work, and was for several years an overseer when the Utah Central was extended from Salt Lake to Utah county. He was the father of 19 children.
