CONGRESSIONAL.

SERATE.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The amendment of the House to the bill providing a pension to the widow of General John J. Crittenden, was introduced into the Senate to increase the amount of the pension, and to make it payable to the widow for life. The bill, and protesting against it, said he was grossly deceived last year, and would never take the faith of the Committee again.

Wright and White again became involved in the storm around the pension. The Senator from Wisconsin, who had kept up unbounded discussions around his house, was now in full bloom, and gradually approaching the Speaker. They waded about in each other's faces, making motions to throw them, and continued theirrimonious skirmish around the floor, and finally came to a vote. When the Speaker submitted the question to the House, the House decided, 189 to 52, that the bill did not fit into either a resolution or a privilege, and voted to sustain the bill.

The conference committee on the appropriation for treasury clerks reported an agreement and a compromise. The report was agreed to.

Sparke, from the appropriation committee, reported the Indian appropriation bill. Referred to the committee of the whole. Adjourned.

Christiansen moved that the rate for mail transportation shall be the same as in Iowa, Kansas and Minnesota. Agreed to.

Kirwan's amendment that the use of bonds to aid in the construction of roads around the mountains be prohibited.

Eaton moved to amend so as to provide that the cost of the roads to be constructed in the State of Oregon should be first obtained to construct the roads around the cascades of the Columbia River.

Eaton moved to amend so as to provide that nothing in the act should be construed as requiring

the payment of a two-thirds affidavit with the written consent of the holders of the preferred stock, was agreed to.

Christiansen submitted an amendment continuing the rights, franchises, etc., to the State of Oregon to provide that no law shall be passed to tax any bondholder of any bond against the company, under its former organization, if such there be.

Christiansen submitted a motion to reconsider the vote by which the bill to provide for the appointment of eighteen additional commissioners to the Paris Exhibition was indefinitely postponed.

Wright moved from the committee on appropriations, reported, without amendment, the House bill appropriating \$200,000 to supply the deficiency in the appropriation for public printing and binding during the past year, and called for a present consideration. Objection was made by Edmunds, who said he did not think it right to rush through a \$200,000 bill on the run, and no one would suffer if it should be laid over until 12 o'clock tonight.

The bill was then read the third time, and passed without division.

Hauser entered a motion to reconsider the vote by which the bill to provide for the appointment of eighteen additional commissioners to the Paris Exhibition was indefinitely postponed.

Wright moved to reconsider the bill to provide for the appointment of eighteen additional commissioners to the Paris Exhibition, but did not give any reason.

Christiansen moved that the bill be suspended from the consideration of the Senate, and the bill was suspended.

Conrad moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Public Lands for further consideration.

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
