## DEMOCRATS ELECT HON. WM. H. KING.

They Carry the State by a Plurality That Will Closely Approach the Four Thousand Mark and are Highly Elated.

Contemplate a Big Ratification in the Near Future Though no Arrangements Have Yet Been Made—State Chairman Walton of the Republican Party is Much Disappointed Over the Large Stay at Home Vote—The Apathy Was Something Remarkable—Democrats Carry Salt Lake, Weber, Cache and Other Big Counties—The Result Was a Surprise to Many—Mr. Hammond Expected a Different Outcome But Thinks the Republicans are Making Progress in Reducing Democratic Majorities.

The speculation and wonderment that existed yesterday regarding the result of the election have given way to an absolute knowledge as to the outcome. The Democrats triumphed even beyond their expectations, though State Chairman Moyle claimed a victory approaching very close in numbers to that which was achieved. The returns received up to the hour of going to press this afternoon give Judge King a plurality of 3,538 and a majority of just 3,000. Some of the more remote counties have not yet been heard from officially. This is also true with some precincts in central or comparatively central counties. Taken all in all, it is estimated that in these the percentage of votes for Mr. King and Mr. Hammond will be at about the same rate as shown by returns already received which will probably give Mr. King a plurality considerably exceeding 3,000.

The Democratic vote will figure closely about the 25,000 mark with the Republican about 4,000 less than that number. Making the grand total of all the parties a little over 50,000 as compared with the Roberts-Eldridge vote of 6,000 in 1892, when Mr. Roberts received a majority of 5,955 or about 15,000 more than that given to Mr. King.

Mr. Hamlin, the Socialist-Labor candidate received a total of 385 votes, 269 coming from Salt Lake county, the remainder being cast in some ten or twelve others.

The counties that placed themselves in the Democratic column are Salt Lake, Weber, Utah, Cache, Summit, Davis, Beaver, Emery, Washington, Uintah, Wasatch, Juab, Iron, Rich, Grand and San Juan. Those that are Republican are Sanpete, Boxelder, Carbon, Kanes, Garfield and Sevier or about sixteen. Toole up to date is a tie as between the two parties. The chances are, however, that it will be found Republican when all of the returns are in. Each of the remaining four counties are also quite close.

Hon. James T. Hammond, when interviewed by the "News" this afternoon, said:

### EICHNOR GOOD NATURED.

**Admits Defeat But Says That This Is Still Utah.**

County Chairman Eichnor of the Republican committee was found at headquarters this afternoon, as he said, settling the fiddler. He was in perfect good humor and added with a merry laugh:

"One side had to beat, and the only trouble is ours is the side that is beaten. Nevertheless, this is the State of Utah, and we shall immediately begin forming our lines for the campaign next fall. When that contest comes off, we expect to be on top. I have nothing further to say than that at present, except that I will go back to my office in a few days. Just now it is water-logged. When it is cleared out I will be found at my desk again."

### LLOYD IS HAPPY TOO.

**Thinks the Result an Endorsement of Democracy.**

Among the most jubilant of the Democrats was County Chairman Lloyd, who put in the greater part of the day attending to election aftermath matters. When asked to state his views of yesterday's battle, he said:

"I consider the result an endorsement by the people of the principles so earnestly and ably contended for by the Democrats as set forth in their platform. We had a good one and stood squarely upon every plank of it, whereas our opponents had absolutely no platform at all. It will be remembered that I stated on Saturday last that Salt Lake City and county would go Democratic by 3,000 majority if a full vote were cast. I still maintain that conclusion to be correct. Those persons who think that all of the stay-at-home people were Republicans are mightily mistaken, as Democrats remained away from the polls in great numbers. When they turn out as they can and will in the next election Salt Lake county will be found deeply and solidly entrenched in the Democratic column. By nominating a strong legislative and county ticket the party is absolutely certain to win in November."

**MOYLE ON THE RESULT.**

**Democratic State Chairman Gives His Views on the Outcome.**

State Chairman Moyle of the Democratic committee was very jubilant today. He said:

"The result of the election demonstrates that Utah is Democratic, and that her people are devoted to the ennobling sentiments contained in the Declaration of Independence and the principles of the Constitution; that bimetallism, the money of the Constitution, which served the nation so well in its infancy and until its mature years, is good enough now; that the flag is indeed the emblem of the Constitution, and that wherever it waves it shall continue to mean social, political and industrial freedom and equality, and special privileges to no favored class."

"We conducted our campaign on national issues. The average voter in Utah is independent and intelligent, and quick to place the seal of his disapproval on any attempt to introduce into our state that should not enter into purely political controversies."
