

YOUNG HOLLANDER SERIOUSLY HURT.

t. H. Winslow Jr. Found Guilty-Little LeRoy Pettey Dead -Baby Falls From Buggy.

Ogden, Utah, April 11 .-- A young Holland boy named Henry Kouw, who has been in this country only a few months, met with painful injuries last evening about 6 o'clock, near the corner of Washington avenue and Twenty-fifth street, which will lay him up for some

Henry, who is about 13 years of age. was riding a bicycle down Twenty-fifth street hill when he lost control of it, and dashed down onto Washington avand dashed down onto Washington av-enue at rapid speed. The bicycle col-lided with a heavy job wagon with great force, throwing the rider to the pavement under the wagon. One wheel passed over his chest before the team could be stopped, and the force of the fail terribly bruised his body, and cut several gashes on his face and head and less. He was picked up in a dazed condition and carried into Culley's drug store, where Dr. A. S. Condon gitended him. He found it necessary to put several stitches in two of the wounds, one on the chin and one on the wounds, one on the chin and one on the leg to close them up, and while it is uncertain to determine as yet whether the lad suffered any internal injuries, the doctor does not believe that he has, and is of the opinion that he will be out again in a week's time. The name of the job wagon driver could not be of the job wagon driver could not be learned, but those who saw the accl-dent say he was in no way to blame for it. The boy, after hav-ing his injuries dressed, was taken to his home.
