**HILTON**—In the 1st Ward of this city, April 11, 1886, of croup, Parley, son of George and Emily Hilton; born Dec. 10, 1883. Also on the 13th inst., of inflammation of the bowels, Ethel, daughter of the same parents, born Jan. 31, 1882.

**GLINES**—In Ashley Fork, Uintah County, March 9th, 1886, of whooping cough, Margaret Elizabeth, daughter of G. A. and Mary Lundquist Glines; born July 24, 1883.

**ROBINSON**—Of old age, at Mill Creek, Salt Lake County, Utah, March 25, 1886, Eli Robinson, formerly of St. Helens, Lancashire, England. Born April 1, 1807, at Wolslawlane, near Bury, Lancashire, England. Embraced the Gospel in 1840; immigrated to Utah in 1866. Was a member of the High Priests' Quorum; a faithful Latter-day Saint, and an honest man. **WRIGHT**—At Paradise, Utah, April 5, 1886, John P. Wright, who was born in Lincoln, Lincolnshire, England, January 18, 1805. He was married to Mary Fish, who survives him, August 31, 1824, by whom he had nine children, five sons and four daughters, three

of whom are now living. His grandchildren number 58 souls, and his great-grandchildren 43 souls.

Father Wright received the Gospel at the hands of Elder George Robbins, June 18, 1845. He was ordained an Elder, then a High Priest. In the year 1849, he emigrated to the United States, locating in Iowa, and remained there until June, 1852, when he started across the plains, and arrived at Draperville, Salt Lake County, September 13th of the same year. He lived here until April 6, 1850, when, in company with a few others he went to Cache Valley, and located at Smithfield. On account of Indian troubles he remained in this place but a short time. In June of the same year, he moved to Wellsville, to remain, however, but a short time, from the fact that in July, the month following, he led a company of thirty families to and located on the banks of Logan River. Taking the Polar star for his base, he laid off the tiers of blocks between Second and Fourth Streets, and from the east side of the public square four blocks, giving to this new location the name of Logan. In the spring of 1862, he moved to Paradise, where he has remained ever since, except eight years—between 1872 and 1880—that he lived in Draperville.—*Utah Journal*.

**STANLEY**—In Fillmore, Millard County, April 12th, 1886, of heart disease and paralysis, Mary Jupp Stanley, wife of James Stanley, born April 29, 1820. She lived and died a faithful Latter-day Saint. *Mill. Star*, please copy.

**STOCKING**—In South Jordan Ward, Salt Lake County, April 16th, 1886, from pneumonia, Harriet Stocking, relict of the late Elder John Jay Stocking, born September 6th, 1814, at Little River, near Westfield, Hampden County, Mass. ## OBITUARY.

**FORDHAM**—At Escalante, Garfield County, U. T., April 1st, 1886, of bilious fever, Sister Mary Moore Black Fordham. She was the beloved wife of Joseph E. Fordham, of Escalante, and the daughter of Elder James G. and Elizabeth M. Black, of St. George. She was born at Mile End, London, England, June 22d, 1835. She was a faithful member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints; treasurer and teacher of the Relief Society, and counselor in the Primary Association of Escalante Ward; all of which duties she performed faithfully. She leaves a sorrowing husband and six small children to mourn her loss; her youngest child being a boy, born March 11, 1886. She was a faithful wife, and affectionate mother. Her mother had the melancholy satisfaction of attending her in her last sickness.

She was buried at Escalante, April 3; and her remains were followed and attended to the grave by over 300 people, forming the largest cortege ever seen at a funeral in the town. The funeral ceremonies were conducted by the Bishopric of the Ward, and touching and appropriate remarks were made by the speakers on that occasion. She died in full faith and fellowship in the Church, and in full hope of rising with the just on the morning of the first resurrection.—*COM.*

**RICHARDS**—Sister Agness Richards, wife of John Richards, was born at Johnston, Lanarkshire, Scotland, June 6, 1808, and died March 30, 1886, at her residence in Mendon, Cache Co., Utah.

In 1821, she, in connection with her father, Alexander Hill and family, immigrated from Scotland, the home of her birth, and settled in Canada. In the early rise of the Church she gave ear to the glad tidings of peace as proclaimed by Elder Samuel Lake, and April 19th, 1840, was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

In 1842, she, in connection with her husband and her father's family, immigrated to Nauvoo. Like the rest of the Saints, she there endured hardships, suffered privations, submitted to vindictive persecutions and shared the persecutions during their expulsion from that place. She also participated in the Saints' wanderings until her arrival in Utah in 1851.

She resided at Mill Creek for a period of eight years; and in 1859 removed to Mendon, Cache County, at which place she resided until her demise.

She was the mother of eleven children, eight of whom are living; fifty-nine grandchildren and eighteen great-grandchildren.

Her last days were spent in pronouncing blessings upon her children, urging them to faithfulness and showing the necessity of keeping God's commandments. Her words were, "I go like a shock of corn fully ripe." She died with the hopes of a glorious resurrection and an exalted seat in the Father's kingdom, to come forth in the morning of the first resurrection and partake of His paradisaic glory.
