There remains to be considered the question of the north-western boundary line. It is to be remembered that the line treaty of 1846 runs by the middle channel which separates the continent from Vancouver's Island but

continent from Vancouver's Island, but several such channels exist. Great Britain contends that the channel of that treaty is the Rosario Straits and the U.S. that it is the Canal de Haro, the channels being separated by the Island of San Juan. This question having once been reported on by a mixed commission the U.S are not content to refer it to another such commission nor has it been deemed convenient, even though such tribunal be appointed by friendly sovereign power. Instead of this it has been agreed, by the present treaty, to submit the question directly to a neutral power, and the Emperor of Germany has been selected for the purpose. The Government of the U.S.
