

and asking the passage by the next Congress of a supplemental civil rights bill, expressing sympathy with Cubans, denouncing Spanish barbarity, concluding with resolutions thanking the President for fully committing himself to the principle of civil rights, expressing gratitude to Charles Sumner, whose name above all others, coming to mind in connection with civil rights, is precious to the colored men. There was great applause on the mention of Sumner's name.

Speeches were made by Sella Martin and the Hon. N. P. Banks in advocacy of the extension of belligerent rights to the Cubans, and the abolition of slavery in Cuba. Addresses were also made by Congressman Rainey and ex-Governor Pinchback.

LOUISVILLE.—The tents of the Great Eastern Circus were blown down to-night, creating intense excitement; it was ascertained that one boy was killed and another injured.

AUGUSTA, Me.—Six inches of snow fell here to-day, and the trains were delayed.

PHILADELPHIA, 11.—Under the name of Henry Williams and Harrison Brown, the Corn Exchange Bank robbers were committed in default of four thousand dollars bail each. A third party escaped.

Fred Douglas lectured last night before a very large audience on his reminiscences of slavery. He relates the mode of his escape from bondage during his lecture, being the first time he has ever publicly divulged the means. He states that he was enabled to leave Baltimore disguised as a sailor, and was met and aided in New York City by friends of the abolition cause.

At a meeting of the Historical Society last night W. Norris made a formal presentation of the Penn manuscripts, consisting of an original letter, documents, &c., in reference to the early history of Pennsylvania and incidentally to other parts of America.

NORRISTOWN, Pa.—By the caving in of a high bank yesterday, on the line of the Storey Creek R. R., now being built, John Delahide was instantly killed, and Pat Kelly seriously injured.

NEW YORK.—The suspension of C. B. Camp & Co., cotton merchants, was announced yesterday.

Gen. Dan'l Butterfield of this city has submitted to the Post Master General an elaborate report upon the local postal system, both collection and delivery, of London and Paris, with suggestions in reference to the adoption of their best features in New York.

The details of a daring burglary, committed in West 50th St. a week ago have just been disclosed. Three masked robbers entered the sleeping apartments of a Mr. Gardner and ransacked the house, taking away however little money. The inmates were terrified by the burglars who brandished knives with which they commanded silence.

The employers and working men are beginning to discuss the proposed movement in various trades in reference to wages and the hours of labor. The employers seem unanimous in opposition to the reduction of the hours, while the workmen are not united, and many regard favorably the ten hour system.
