

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 7.—The *Times*, replying to the arguments of free traders, drawn from the progress of America, prints a long comparative statement, tending to show the trade of Great Britain has increased even more wonderfully, that the increase of American imports, especially in articles such as grain, for which America has natural advantages, and to which she gives no protection. The *Times* estimates the money and trade loss to America, through the decline of her shipping of £16,000,000.

The usual Guy Fawkes celebration was held last evening. The effigies of Gladstone, Parnell, Bigger and others, were burned in the poorer districts of London, according as the Irish or English element predominated. No disturbance occurred. Among the effigies burned at Lewes, where the anniversary was as usual celebrated with great eclat, was one of Guiteau.

The *New Era*, from Hong Kong for San Francisco, went ashore at Cape Bajador, and is a total loss. The crew were saved.

VIENNA, 7.—Liberal organs condemn the introduction of military law in Bosnia and Herzegovina without consulting Parliament. They consider it equivalent to the final annexation of the provinces, and extinction of the last remnants of the Sultan's authority.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 7.—Advices from Mecca to the end of October, say the number of cases of cholera average 15 daily. Number of pilgrims in the city, 100,000.

LONDON, 7.—James Tuite, formerly secretary of the Mulligan Branch of the Land League, who was discharged from Kilmalsham Jail on Friday night, was re-arrested today, it is supposed because of his violent speeches. Much excitement.

MAIDSTONE, 7.—The trial of Arthur Lefroy, for the murder of Gold, came to a close today. The court room was densely crowded, and a remarkable number of women were present. The Lord Chief Justice, summing up for the prosecution was strongly against the prisoner, and tended to throw discredit on the point on which the defense relied, that Lefroy had not pawned the pistol, and showed an entire disbelief in the prisoner's assertion that a third person was present in the railway car at the time of the murder. The prisoner was found guilty and sentenced to be hanged. After sentence, then passed, Lefroy protested his innocence.

BERLIN, 7.—In the second ballot for the member of the Reichstag, Dr. Falk was victorious at Worms by a sweeping majority. Most of the second elections up to the present time resulted in favor of the liberals.

HANLEY, 7.—Various towns of Staffordshire potteries are on the eve of a gigantic strike. All the men connected with the Operatives Association have resolved to cease work on Thursday, unless an advance is granted. The strike will affect fifty thousand employees. At a meeting yesterday the employers pledged themselves to refuse the advance.

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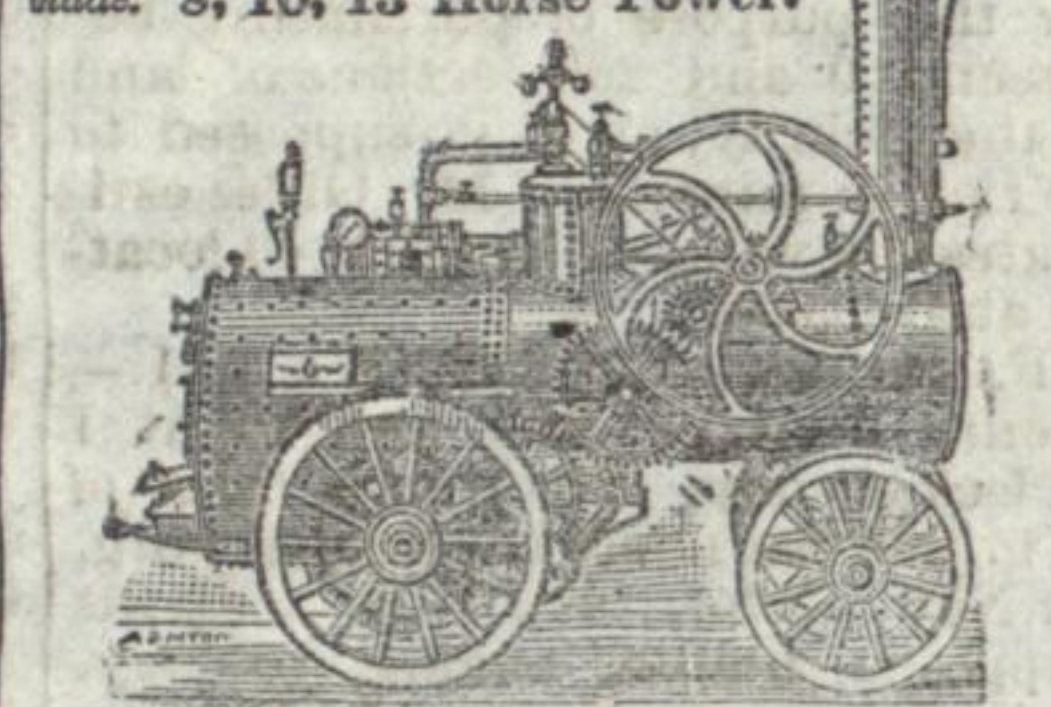
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
