

COUNCIL BREAKS PREVIOUS RECORDS.

Holds a Meeting Without Introducing a Resolution or an Ordinance.

THE BOND VOTE IS CANVASSED.

City Engineer Gets Busy on Water Supply—Joint Building Insurance To Be Increased.

For the first time in several years there was not one new resolution or ordinance of any nature presented at the regular meeting of the city council last night. Such an occurrence is decidedly unusual and may not happen again for several years. The council met in special session yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock and canvassed the vote cast at the special bond election and hence there was not much business before the regular session last night. There was only one change in the vote from the figures first announced. One vote was lost for the bonds in the First district making the majority for the bonds in the entire city 166 votes instead of 167.

ENGINEER GETTING BUSY.

City Engineer Snow, asked for an appropriation of \$2,500 to carry on the engineering work for the additional water supply. The matter was referred by the special water committee. This is the first action taken on the water proposition since the bond election. It means that the work of surveying will be pushed as rapidly as possible.

JOINT BUILDING INSURANCE.

The insurance on the joint building was again discussed at length. The committee on control recommended that the insurance be increased from \$25,500 to \$160,000 but Black wanted it increased to \$200,000 as he deemed the firm named among independent contractors to be the building. There was also some agreement on the distribution of the insurance among the various companies, a protest being received from the Home Fire Insurance company against its proportion of the insurance. Fernstrom raised the point that the contract entered into with the county relative to the control of the building gave the committee on control power to act in all such matters without the approval of the council. The point was sustained by President Hewlett and the committee will act.

The resolution by Wells, providing for the payment of \$250 to Miss Eddington, deputy city auditor, for her services during the time her name did not appear on the payrolls of the city, was taken out of the hands of the municipal laws committee but it was defeated, after considerable discussion, by a vote of 5 to 5. It required a vote of a majority of the council to pass it for the reason that it provided for the expenditure of money.

WANTS HIS JOB BACK.

James Sennett petitioned the council to have his name reinstated on the payrolls of the waterworks department as he claims that he was not legally removed from the position as tankman at the Thirteenth East street reservoir by Supt. Hines and Mayor Morris on Dec. 2, 1904. Mr. Sennett says that he was reinstated by Supt. Hines and confirmed by the council and that he was not removed by the council because his removal was illegal. Since the above date he says he has been acting as tankman along with his successor, C. E. Angell, but that his name has been dropped from the payroll. The matter was referred to the waterworks committee with the city attorney as solicited.

MORAN SUBMITS BILL.

B. J. Moran submitted another bill to the council for the balance of \$1,000 due him on the contract for installing the heating plant in the new city jail over a year ago. The money has been held up on account of a misunderstanding in regard to installing a smoke consumer at the jail. A mistake was made by the American Stoker company in its bid which would have resulted in loss to Mr. Moran hence he refused to insist that the consumer be deducted from his contract. The value of the same as stated in his bid. The council insisted on him installing the consumer and held up the balance due on his contract. A motion was made by Ed. H. Davis last evening to have the amount of the bill placed on the appropriation list to the credit of Mr. Moran. The motion was lost and the bill was filed but at the next meeting Ed. H. Davis will move for a reconsideration.

WHAT ELECTION COST.

City Recorder Critchlow submitted the payrolls for the judges of the special bond election amounting to \$26,300 and for rent of polling places amounting to \$192.50 which were referred to the finance committee with the chairman of the special election committee associated with power to act.

Frank Jordan was appointed as a special policeman by Chief Lynch upon the request of Walker Bros. Dry Goods company to act without pay from the city. The appointment was confirmed.

Upon motion of Fernstrom the report of the special asphalt committee, in regard to the purchase of certain asphalt claims, was laid over for two weeks.

Upon the recommendation of the waterworks committee the wages of Albert Swenson and Harry Goddard, employees of the waterworks department, were increased from \$4 to \$2.50 per day.

CASE CONTINUED.

Burrell Brothers, Alleged Holdups, Will be Tried Jan. 23.

The case of the State of Utah against Walter E. and Edmund Burrell, charged with robbery, has been continued by Judge Armstrong until Jan. 23. The defendants are charged with holding up John F. Kirk with a revolver on the night of Nov. 26, 1904, and taking a sum of \$46. The case was set for trial in the criminal division of the district court today but was continued upon motion of Attorney S. P. Armstrong, who was appointed by Judge Lewis to defend the men.

Panama seems destined to take the place of the Philippines in this particular regard.
