LEARN A TRADE,

ACCORDING to the report of the Prison Association just issued we see it stated that of the 13,496 prisoners in the penitentiaries of thirty States in 1867, seventy-seven per cent, that is more than three quarters, had not learned a trade. This is a significant and impressive fact and one that should not be lost sight of. It speaks highly for the effect of regular It speaks highly for the effect of regular habits upon those who learn a trade. Young men, to acquire the knowledge ance. of a trade, must be industrious and cultivate habits of application. These are a safeguard against temptation. Those who work at a trade for a living are kept too closely at their business to have their minds occupied by evil thoughts; they have but little time to study mischief.

It should be the aim of every parent to teach his sons some handicraft. Whether they follow their trades for a livelihood through life or not, they will find the knowledge very convenient and useful. A man who has a good trade is comparatively independent; he can follow it or lead out in some other direction; but if he enter upon another branch of business, he has his trade to fall back upon in case of failure. In this country there has been considerable indifference manifested by young men about acquir-ing trades. There have been reasons for this in the past. 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
