CHICAGO, 24.-- A special to the Tribune says the drafts upon the legal tender reserve have been quite heavy of late, and it is official-ly stated that thirty-one millions were expended up to and including

were expended up to and including Thursday, leaving but thirteen millions unexpended. The Michigan State grangers, in convention at Kalamazoo, have adopted a resolution declaring that railroads are amenable to State regulations as much as plank and gravel road companies, and that the legislature has as much right to regulate their charges as to fix turnpike tolls or the charges of millers for grinding grain. Accom-panying this assertion of right is an appeal to railroad companies to re-member that their interests are identical with those of farmers, and not te kill by exorbitant charges the agricultural goose that lays the golden eggs.
