**WASHINGTON, 17.—**The pending bill in the morning hour, to authorize the establishment of export tobacco manufactory and for drawbacks on imported articles used in manufacturing tobacco, was called up. The bill provides that it shall be lawful to establish export tobacco manufactory for the manufacture of tobacco exclusively for exportation under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe, and the provisions of section 432 of the Revised Statutes and sections 14 and 15 of the act of May 28, 1884, entitled "An act to amend the laws in relation to internal revenue," so far as applicable, shall be in force in respect to such manufactory, and that the same drawback be allowed to a manufacturer who shall use ion or molasses in his export tobacco manufactory, upon which import duty has been paid, that would be allowed under existing laws to a manufacturer of the same; such drawbacks to be allowed and paid on a pro rata basis; that the exports of manufactured tobacco now produced in export tobacco manufactory be entitled to a drawback of 90 per cent of the duty paid upon such imported articles as are actually used in the manufactory, such exported tobacco upon such evidence and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury. The bill passed.
