narrow; we begin plowing at the, outside one year finishing at the center, then next time the field is plowed begin at center, and by a little care we finish at the outside with practically no loss of time, and have no dead furrows; also keep the land level. After plowing is done the harrow and drag or roller are set to work and the soil made fine and mellow. We have no set number of times to harrow, but stay at it till the seed bed is right. We use the spring tooth harrow and a drag or board float to prepare the seed bed I have also used the disk harrow before plowing and am sure it paid well. This was on blue grass sod. It was cut both ways in small lands and made the plowing much easier for the team. The underside was harrowed as well as the top. As stated above, we always try to have our corn after clover. The clover is either pastured with sheep and young cattle or cut for hay, or if hay is not needed badly, is clipped and left to be turned under. We like the plan of pasturing with sheep, as they do not injure the land by tramping, which is the objection to pasturing with heavy stock. We have never used fertilizer other than stable manure. With this we cover as large an area as possible

"From the first to the fifteenth of May we consider a good time to plant corn. The ground is usually warm enough by the first of May to sprout

enough by the first of May to sprout the seed quickly, thus insuring vigorous growth—this is what we want. If planted too early the plants usually come up sickly and yellow and never give the best results. Also the cut worm gets in his-work sometimes. For a number of years we have made it a practice to begin planting from the sth to the 12th of May and see no rea-son to chance now.

son to change now. PLANTING AND CULTIVATING.

We use the checkrower and prefer it to planting in drills Have tried both methods with good success, but think we can keep the land leveler by plow-ing both ways. We desire this on acing both ways. We desire this on ac-count of sowing wheat after the corn, which we alreays do. We do not object to the plan of drilling, as some of our best crops have been grown in drills. Have used most a shoe planter with concave wheels which firms the soil over and about the sed. The shoes are run three inchas deep, sometimes a bi-

Our seed corn is selected in the fall just before the corn is cut, as we desire to see the kind of stalk, the height of the ear from the ground and the way it hangs. The requirements are that the grain shall be pure yellow, slightly dented, red cob, straight rows and filled out to the ends; the stalk strong and stocky, the ear growing about 414 feet from ground, and turned down at the point. We save twice as much as we wish to plant and store in a dry out-building, laying it on boards one layer deep till thoroughly dry; it is then sacked and hung to rafters by wires to keep vermin out. Have never had poor seed corn when kept as described, Good seed corn may be easily told by the seed corn may be easily told by the clean, healthy appearance of the germ after one is accustomed to examination of both good, and bad seed. We have often tested in pots and have always found a very small per cent of poor grains in our seed corn, while corn from the crib tested in the same way

would whow as much as 50 per cent poor grains. This is not always the case, however VALUE OF SHREDDED FODDER.

The corn folder in this section where saved and shredded is worth nearly as much as the corn would have sold for at husking time.
