

New Athletic Feld to be Built on Bank Of Hudson River Costing Over \$1,000,000.

New York, March 4 -- A spacious and splendidly equipped athletic field, costing \$1,000,000, is proposed for Columbia university in plans filed with President Butler today by the committee he appointed some time ago to take matter up.
