Grasshoppers.—A gentleman just arrived from Sanpete states that the prospects are that grasshoppers will have their own way in that region this year. He estimates that there are enough eggs deposited to produce 100 bushels of the "iron clade" to the acre. The people are doing all in their power to destroy them. Chickens to the number of from 5,000 to 10,000 are let loose on the farms and, it is said, devour the hopper's eggs with great avidity, and in addition to such protective measures, the farmers are skimming the soil and burying the egg-laden ground in trenches constructed for that purpose. Others are plowing the eggs under, in hopes of putting them where they will do the least harm when hatching time arrives. Considerable apprehension is felt and double the amount of the advisability of doing much plowing this year. We learn from other sources that the same feeling is prevalent in Coconino, where it is feared the devouring pests will commit great ravages this year.

PRIESTHOOD MEETING.

The regular monthly meeting of the Priesthood of this Stake was held in the Assembly Hall, beginning at 11 a. m. to-day, Counselor David O. Calder presiding. Singing, "The morning breaks, the shadows flee." Prayer by Bishop E. D. Woolley. Singing, "Great is the Lord." Roll call showed all the Wards of the Stake represented by presiding authorities, excepting the 8th and 20th City Wards.

Counselor Calder stated that a meeting of the Stake Presidents had preceded President A. M. Cannon and Counselor Joseph E. Taylor from attending this meeting. He also announced that as other meetings, connected with Conference, might be held to-morrow night, it had been deemed wisdom to suspend the usual evening meetings in the various Wards.

The statistical report of the Stake for the quarter ending Feb. 28, 1891, was read and showed the total of souls as 21,008; this being a net increase of 571 during the quarter. The Tithing reports of the Stake gave the total receipts as \$143,432.27; this being more than was paid for the year 1879.

The report of Temple offerings for the Stake showed as follows: For the year 1879, \$3,066.97; for the year 1880, \$7,356.62. The report of the Relief Societies of the Stake for the half year ending March 5th, 1891, presented the following: Statistical—Total officers and members, 3,589; meetings held, 317; average attendance, 735. Financial—On hand at the date of last report: Cash \$1,333.72; property, \$7,250.39; wheat bushels, 3,645. Receipts since last report: Cash, \$74,874.55; property, \$1,070.64; wheat bushels, 160. Disbursements—To the poor, for emigration, Temple, etc., cash, \$1,576.75; property, \$3,363.29. On hand, cash, \$1,650.67; property, \$7,385.77; wheat bushels, 3,300; flour, 3,100 lbs.; beans, 200 lbs.; wheat, 100 bushels; not returned, 101 bush. The report of the Sunday School for the year ending December 31, 1890, showed as follows: Total number of officers and teachers, 507; average attendance, 612. Total number of pupils, 6,008; average attendance, 4,353. Total number of classes, 532. Number of books in libraries, 5,101. Funds on hand last year, \$367.35; collected since, \$1,070.64; wheat bushels, \$1,333.72. Funds in the treasury, \$4,297.75.

After the presentation of the above reports, other business, Counselor D. O. Calder made a series of interesting remarks upon various topics, touching some things needing correction among the Saints, and imparting instructions to the officers of the priesthood in the discharge of their duties.
