speaker said in part: "For some reason, which I am un-able to explain, the men of the west think it a disgrace to enter the na-tional guard. In the east this is just the opposite-men are anxious for na-tional guard honors. Ever since the Spanish-American war and especially cince the Japanese war, the United States army board has seen the nec-essity of educating men in personal essity of educating men in personal care in time of sickness and injury. "In the Spanish-American war more men died from lack of such knowledge than were killed in battle. In the Jap-

than were killed in battle. In the Jap-anese viar it was just the opposite. The men who enlist in the corps will have a mæring once a week. At these meet-ings demonstrations will be given as to how to care for a man in time of injury; lectures will be given as to how to battle with disease, which is bound to spring up when large bodies of men-get together; trips will be taken to the local hospitals and the men will be set together; trips will be taken to the local hospitals and the men will be taken to see post-mortem examina-tions.
