At Draper, June 29th, after an illness of nearly six months, HARRIETT, wife of Benjamin Green, aged 66 years, 3 months and 7 days, daughter of John and Elizabeth Cook.

Sister Green was born at South Normanton, Derbyshire, England, on the 7th of March, 1813; she joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Mansfield, was baptized by Elder Martin Slack, and emigrated from Sutton in Ashfield, Nottinghamshire, to Utah in 1856 in Captain Martin's handcart company. She was a kind, faithful wife and mother, loved and respected by all who knew her; her integrity to the truth never faltered, and she died as she had lived with a bright anticipation of a glorious resurrection.—[COM.]

At St. George, Utah, June 16, 1879, JAMES BIRD, aged 72 years, 5 months and 24 days.

Deceased was born Dec. 23, 1806, in Roxbury, N. J. He was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in June, 1835, and moved to Kirtland, Ohio, where he joined the Kirtland camp and moved the same fall to Far West, Mo. He endured the persecutions and mobbings which were there visited upon the Saints, and spent the winter of 1839 in moving the poor from Missouri to Illinois. He moved his family to Illinois in the spring of 1839. In 1842 he was ordained an Elder and moved to Nauvoo. In 1844, where he was ordained into the 13th Quorum of Seventies the same year. He left Nauvoo for winter quarters in 1847, and moved to Utah in 1851. He settled in Provo and in June 1852 was ordained a High

Priest and was set apart as bishop of the 2nd Ward, Provo. In 1861 he was called on a mission to Southern Utah, was one of the first settlers in St. George, where he resided till his death. He died as he had for forty-five years lived, in full faith of the gospel as revealed through the Prophet Joseph Smith.—[COM.]

At St. George, Utah, on the 26th day of June, 1879, at 10 o'clock p.m., in a quiet and peaceful manner, ADELLA, daughter of Charles E. and Ruth Y. Johnson, aged 4 months and 5 days.

At Logan, June 16th, 1879, KNUD TORGERSON, aged 46 years, 5 months and 4 days.

Deceased was baptized March 13, 1864, in Norway; emigrated to Utah in 1865; went to Sanpete as pioneer telegrapher on the Deseret Line; moved to Logan in 1868, at which place he was telegraph operator.

He leaves a wife and five children to mourn his loss; was a good husband and father and a consistent Latter-day Saint. He died firm in the faith and in the hope of a glorious resurrection.—[COM.]

In St. Charles, June 25th, 1879, Bishop ISAAC HILL, at the age of 73 years.

His disease is supposed to have been rheumatism in the chest, with he has been afflicted for several weeks. He died suddenly while sitting on his bed with his feet resting on the floor. His funeral took place at St. Charles on the 27th ult. Appropriate remarks were made by Bishops J. Fugimore, J. A. Hunt, Robert Pope and Brother N. Williamson.

Brother Hill was born in 1806, and joined the Church at an early day, passing through the hardships incident to the expulsion from Missouri and Illinois; crossed the plains in 1850; acted as Bishop of the 2nd Ward of Salt Lake City for a period of twelve years; moved to Bear Lake in 1864, and has just ended a faithful career in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He was born July 2nd, 1834, at Hereford, England.

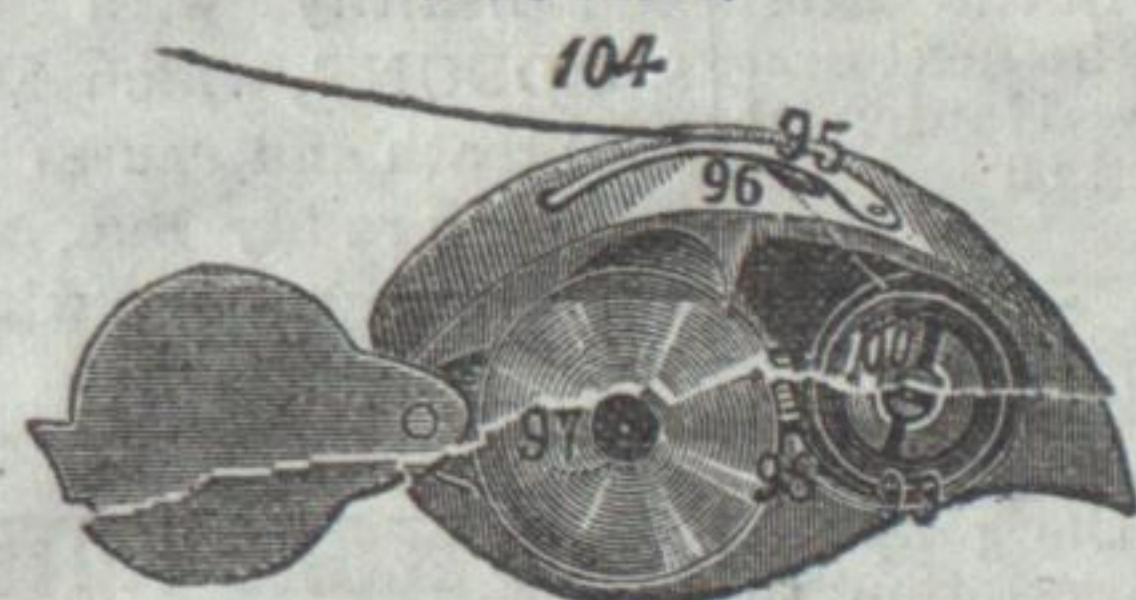
