ANNOUNCEMENT OF TH DEATH OF PERSIDENT JOHN TAYLOR.

ONCE more the Latter-day Saints are called upon to mourn the death o their leader-the man who has beld the keys of the Kingdom of God upor earth. PRESIDENT JOHN TAYLOR de parted this life at five minutes to eigh; o'clock on the evening of Monday July 25th, 1887, aged 78 years, 8 month

In communicating this sad intelligence to the Church, over which hhas so worthly presided for nearly ter years past, we are diled with emotion too deep for atterance. A faith ful, devoted, and fearless servan' of God, the Church in his death halest its most conspicuous and experienced leaders Steadfast to and immovable in the truth, few men have ever lived who have manifested such integrity and such unfinching mora and physical courage as our beloved. President who has just gone from u-He never knew the feeling of fear con nected with the work of God. Bu in the face of angry mebs, and at other times when in miniminent danger of per sonal violence from those who threat ened his life, and upon occasions when the people were medaced with public peril, he never blenched, -his knees sever trambled, his hand never shook. Every Latter-day Saint always knew beforehand, on occasionwhen firmness and courage were needed. where PRESEDENT JOHN TAYLOR would be found and what his tone would be. He met every issue square ly, boldly and in a way to call forth heard him. Undaunted courage, un yielding tirmness were among his most prominent characteristics, giving him tinguished for the same qualities. intense love of freedom and hatred of oppression. He was a man whom he enjoyed, to an extent surpassed by none, the implicit confidence of the Prophets Joseph, Hyrum and Brigham and all the leading men and members of the Church. The title of "Cham pion of Liberty," which he received in Nauvoo, was always felt to be most appropriate for him to bear. But it was not only in the possession o these qualities that PRESIDENT TAYLOR was great. His judgment was remarkably sound and clear. the wisdom of his counsels and teach ings. His great experience made his suggestions exceedingly valuable; for there has scargely been a public move ment of any kind commenced, carried en, or completed, since he joined the Church in which he has not taken

But it is not necessary that we should, even if time permitted, re-hearse the events of his long and busy life. To do so would only be to give a greater part of the nistory of the Church; for with it his biography iinseparably interwoven.

The last time PRESIDENT TAYLOR appeared in public was on Sunday, Feb ruary 1st, 1885. On that occasion he delivered a lengthy discourse in the Tabernacle, in Salt Lake City. Rumorhad been floating around for some time that his arrest was contemplated. It fact, while returning from a trip to the settlements in Arizona, he was advised in California that he was in great danger, and it was suggested that perhaps it would be better for him not to return to Salt Lake City. He listener to these cautions but still resolved to take the risk, and came back and fear lessly went about his business fo time. But on the evening of Sunday, February 1st, he concluded to withdraw himself from the puoliperformance of his numerous and im portant duties. In taking this step be did so more to preserve peace and to remove all possible cause of excitement, than from any desire for per sonal safety. He perceived that therwas a determination on the part of men holding official position here to raise an issue and, if possible, involve the Latter-day Saints in seri ous trouble. He had not broken any law. He knew he was innocent and that if he were arrested and could have a fair trial, nothing could be

brought against him. He had takes every precaution that a man could take under his circumstances to makwas determined that, so far as he way concerned, he would furnish no pre text for trouble, but would do evenple over whom he presided from being involved in difficulty.

From that date, upwards of two

years and a half ago, when he left his home in Salt Lake City, he had not had the opportunity of crossing its threshold again.
