

The Story of Rigby's Achievements During the Year

THE story of Rigby's achievements during the past year can best be told in plain, simple facts, rather than indulging in newspaper glittering generalities. The reading public has of late years read so much "boom talk" in the newspapers of various kinds, concerning different towns, that it is becoming sort of a bore, and the desire in this short article to state nothing but facts. From the size of the town Rigby, of course, does not attract an over amount of attention, but a traveler who stops over here invariably remarks, "What a busy town. More people are seen on your business streets, and greater activity seems to prevail in Rigby than in the other towns along the line, most of which are larger. This is true."

DENOTE ACTIVITY.

Rigby's streets always denote activity. As the years go by the people in the surrounding country are learning more and more that their wants in a business way can be looked after here as well, if not better, than anywhere else. More than a dozen country settlements surrounding the town, all within about six miles, find in Rigby their railway and express shipping point, their trading, banking and general outfitting source. There is today in Rigby 35 business concerns, all of which seem to be in a thriving condition.

The cause of this general prosperity, of course, is the extensive and unequalled agricultural country of which Rigby is the business center. Good farming land, abundantly watered, surrounds the town in every direction for 15 miles. The climate is excellent, making it possible to produce fruit in large quantities, as well as sugar beets and other farm products. This year two straight carloads of apples were shipped from this point, and sufficient shipments by local freight were made to easily make up another car, were sent from here. This is a good showing when a few years ago fruit raising in this vicinity was thought unpromising. The records of the railway station show that 320 car loads of home-grown produce was loaded and shipped from Rigby during September, October and November of this year, the value of some of these carloads running up to over \$900 each.

ABANDONED BIG SALARY.

Mr. T. W. Lee, formerly general passenger and ticket agent of the Delaware & Lackawanna Railroad company, with headquarters in New York, left a \$15,000 salary to locate and farm in Idaho. The results of his first year's (1907) operations is as follows: 16,000 bushels of wheat, several hundred bushels of oats, six cars of potatoes, over 500 tons of hay and other smaller crops. He has also secured 2,900 acres, located a mile southeast of Rigby, called the Bungalow, is rapidly changing from a sagebrush waste into a model farm. Nearly a 1,000 acres was put into crop last season, and double this amount will be planted next year. After his first year's experience Mr. Lee is more enthusiastic over Idaho's possibilities than ever. If such men can leave such high positions in the eastern commercial world to avail themselves of the great resources Idaho offers, why cannot many smaller means and less fortunate do likewise? It is not necessary to go to Canada or Mexico to find all things that go to make up prosperous and wealthy communities, or the best of opportunities for the investment of capital, or obtain homes. Better opportunities exist right here for investment than rubber or banana plantation stock in Mexico, and all this close at home and in the most delightful and progressive state in the Union.

MANY IMPROVEMENTS.

Rigby shows the following improvements and growth during 1907: The Western Mill & Elevator company is just finishing a 75,000 bushel grain elevator, with large cellar for the safe handling of potatoes and other perishable freight. The Idaho Power and Transportation company has built its pole line into the town, and before this article is read the town of Rigby will be lighted with electricity, and furnished electrical power, generated by the mighty Snake river near by. The Call block, in which is located the Golden Rule store, has doubled its ground floor space and added another story to the entire building. The Rigby Furniture company has the foundation in for its large brick store. The Whippleman Jewelry store, 25x70 feet, has just been completed with modern plate glass front. The Rigby Milling company has just completed a large additional warehouse, to meet the demands of its business. Rigby also boasts of new plank sidewalks in the residence district, and a new street sprinkler, which improvements have made it much more pleasant to live in this thriving town. The Rigby school, housed in a \$15,000 modern building, is the equal of any city school in the intermountain country. In addition to furnishing excellent school facilities for Rigby's numerous children, it furnishes high school opportunities for the surrounding country districts.

SUPPLY BIG TRADE.

One noticeable feature in Rigby's commercial life this year is the large number of people from Star Valley, Wyo., and Grand and Swan valleys up the South Fork of Snake river, that come here for their winter supplies. A good road has now been built from Rigby up the river to those valleys, making the distance to Rigby shorter and the opportunities better than to the Bear Lake country, hence the innovation.

Indications are stronger now than ever before, that the Chicago & Northwestern Railway company, will extend its line from its present western terminus at Shoshone, Wyo., a distance of about 200 miles east of Rigby, into Idaho via the South Fork of Snake river, and across the valley near the Hub city for the west. This is what is needed more than any other thing in Idaho today. Such a road would forever settle the shortage of coal as boundless quantities of this fuel exist in the mountains east of this valley. It would also furnish the added railway facilities so badly needed in addition to what the valley already has, because this country has now developed entirely beyond the capacity of the present railroad, which is particularly true of Rigby.

In tearing down the old building the contractors uncovered a small metal box, which was placed in the corner-stone of the structure at the time the foundation was started, on Sept. 8, 1857. This box was recently removed to the Exchange's new home, and upon being opened by President Ogden D. Budd in the presence of the entire board of governors, was found to contain, among other relics, particles of the bones of Christopher Columbus, which for over 200 years have quietly rested amid all the bustle and bustle of one of the busiest parts of New York's most prominent thoroughfares.

Every minute of the day throngs of people for nearly a quarter of a century have passed the spot, unimpressed by the fact that they have been in the presence of portions of all that remains of the "great discoverer" of their country. With the little gold-mounted urn holding the portions of Columbus' bones was a letter written by G. W. Charles O. Wilson, who when the late cornerstone of the old building was laid, was president of the exchange. This city of the venerable relic, reads as follows:

"Herewith I hand you my contribution to the cornerstone ceremony of our new and beautiful exchange building. It is a few grains of all that remains of Christopher Columbus. On Sept. 10, 1857, Jose Maria Castillo, a Cuban engineer, made some repairs to the walls of the cathedral in Santo Domingo. This noble structure was several times and partially built by Diego Columbus in 1511. In tearing away the defective masonry, some bones on which was inscribed 'San Cristobal Colon.'
