 Quite a heavy shower fell yesterday.  
 The University opens next Monday.  
 We are in the midst of a relay spell.  
 The Cottonwood tourists are returning.  
 City Council meets to-morrow night.  
 C. R. Savage, Esq., has gone to Frisco.  
 The Third District Court resumed business to-day.  
 Yesterday's rains rolled the streams materially.  
 Brother Charles Kramer, of the 15th Ward, died yesterday. Funeral to-day.  
 Quite a number of strangers attended the Tabernacle yesterday afternoon.  
 Five hundred graders are employed on the railroad extension west of Nephi.  
 The Second District Court convenes at Beaver on the first Monday in September.  
 The Bishopric of the 5th Ward assisted in dispensing the sacrament Sunday afternoon.  
 The Seventh Ward brass band will go on an excursion to Black Rock, on Thursday next.  
 A horse runaway is called by the Ogden Herald an extraordinary event. How about a runaway ox?  
 The town of Alta is at present but a mere relic of its former self, both in appearance and prosperity.  
 Hugh Douglass, the little boy who accidentally shot himself on Friday evening, is rapidly recovering.  
 Constable Samuel Bateman and his brother William, of West Jordan, spent the sabbath in Salt Lake.  
 The canyon creeks are gradually drying up. Our milkmen will soon have to depend entirely upon their cows.  
 It has been suggested that Roscoe Conkling would make a good hotel clerk; but he is not haughty and overbearing enough.  
 In Ogden, when a team runs away through the carelessness of the driver, he is promptly arrested and tried for the offense.  
 The Leader says that young Skaukey, who was shot in Logan Canyon, is recovering fast and is now considered out of danger.  
 The Eleventh Ward Choir and their friends will spend Wednesday at Lake Powell. A good time is anticipated. All the Ward invited.  
 A couple of individuals, for fighting, were taken into custody. It proved to be an assault. One was fined \$10, and the other discharged.  
 Wellsville, Cache County, was visited by a terrific wind storm on the 8th inst. Large trees were uprooted, and haystacks swept into nothingness.  
 Bathing trains on the Utah and Nevada now leave Lake Powell 25 minutes earlier than heretofore. They leave here at 4:40 and arrive here at 7:55 p.m.  
 Mrs. George Romeril and her ten year old son, of Lynne, were thrown out of a wagon in Ogden on Saturday, but not seriously hurt. A runaway collided with their team.  
 The Relief Society of the Twenty-first Ward intend having an enjoyable time at Black Rock to-morrow and the Sunday School of the same Ward will follow suit a week hence.  
 Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Douglass, Mrs. Mary V. Young, Mrs. Emma Ellertsen, Mr. H. E. Richards, Mr. H. M. Wells, Mr. W. J. Beattie, Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Carlson have returned from Big Cottonwood canyon.  
 Two young boys got to fighting in Frisco last Friday, and one of them drew three knives in succession upon his opponent, but was each time disarmed. If Frisco were not a Gentile mining town, this might be called a result of Mormon polygamy.  
 LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.  
 Heavy Rain.—We learn from a correspondent that a heavy rain storm passed over American Fork Canyon yesterday. Every hedge in the canon is reported to have been swept away. The exact amount of damage is not yet ascertained, but must be great. The volume of water passed down the old channel through American Fork city, and spent its fury on the hay fields and farms below, covering the land with debris.  
 District Court.—Proceedings in the Third District Court on Monday, August 11, 1891, Chief Justice Hunter presiding:  
 Ann L. Dewey et al., vs. Wm. H. Folson; judgment in accordance with remittitur.  
 Jacob Feller vs. Caleb Luker; motion to correct and amend transcript, an appeal by Justice of Peace on affidavit filed. Court allows appeal to file counter affidavit.  
 Wm. S. Chaves vs. E. W. Westcott; housing in motion of defendant to vacate, etc., continued by the Court, and placed regularly on the calendar. Defendant allowed stay of proceedings pending decision of motions and five days after that to file answer.  
 James Tucker vs. J. S. Johnson et al.; Court reverses opinion and orders judgment by consent of plaintiff dismissing the case.  
 John and Jens Olson, defendants against defendant J. S. Johnson and R. R. Madison in default.  
 Term adjourned sine die.

Camping in the Cottonwoods.—One of the most beautiful, as it is undoubtedly one of the most popular places of summer resort in Utah, is the locality known as the Cottonwood Lakes, a small tract of territory situated at the head of Big Cottonwood Canyon, at an altitude of something more than 10,000 feet above the level of the sea. From this the character of the climate can be easily imagined by those who have never had the opportunity of enjoying it. The main valley is about a mile long and half a mile in width, and is pleasantly diversified with forests, lakes, meadows, brooks and bays, the last named feature luxuriantly predominating. This limited area is principally owned by the Messrs. Walker Brothers and by Mr. and Mrs. Brighton, the former's pre-emption taking in nearly all the southern portion of the vale, while the Brighton property has the north, including theoretically, the placid sheet of water known as Silver Lake, which hugs the base of the pine-clad cliff on the west and south. East of this and separated only by a smooth spread of pasture land, is the Hotel, kept by the genial Mrs. Brighton, who, in the absence of her worthy husband in Scotland, performs the duties of hostess to the mountain style. Dr. W. F. Anderson, H. W. Lawrence, Esq., and Charles Read, Esq., have also built summer residences in the valley, and for several seasons have taken their families to spend the hot summer months in that cool and delightful region. The hotel is at present crowded with guests, a number of whom are happy to secure board and lodging at \$12 per week, with a blanket couch on the sitting room floor. On the Walker property, besides their own commodious house, are pitched the tents of several parties of Salt Lake engaged in the pleasant pastime of acquiring health and killing mosquitoes. The most noticeable are Camps A and B, containing respectively a dozen persons of either sex, about the most illustrious and beautiful sets of individuals that ever visited the mountains. The chief occupation of these rival communities is in giving lawn fetes (pronounced "long fees" in the canyon), to which the inhabitants of the hotel and other places are gratuitously invited, with the tacit understanding that each succeeding event is to live in their memories as "the very best of the season." Each camp has nobly striven to out-do its competitor, and no doubt is well satisfied that it has come off victorious. It has rained almost incessantly in the canyon during the past two weeks, but not even this can dampen the spirits of our jovial tourists, who, when the showers extinguish their bonfires, betake themselves to the interior of the tents, and sing and crack dry jokes to offset the humidity of the weather. The "Patter of the Rain" has been a very popular ballad for the last fortnight. Of course, Lakes "Martha," "Katharine," "Annette," and the snow-capped mountains surrounding, have been visited, the wondrous beauty of which need not now be dilated upon. Mr. Fred Lambourn, the talented artist, is a sojourner at the Brighton hotel, and makes frequent excursions to the upper lakes, with a view to some paintings in the future.

Struck by Lightning.—During the shower of yesterday, the lightning played around fearfully in some places, and a few terrific claps of thunder were heard. One of the loudest was just previous to 12 o'clock. The flash which preceded it, struck the house of Mr. John Sheriff, of 21st Ward and inflicted about \$20 worth of damage to the building, but fortunately no one was seriously injured. The family were seated at a window when a gust of wind came through and threw down the blind. Mr. Sheriff arose and tacked it in place again, and had just taken his seat, when the lightning struck the pinnacle surmounting the gable of the house. Glancing downward, it tore through the window frame, scattered the curtain into shreds, and passed over the heads of the household. After making the circuit of the room once or twice, the electric visitor went out at the door, much to the relief of the frightened family. Additional to the damage described, some plaster was torn from the wall and a limited extent. Mr. Sheriff received a considerable shock, but was not dangerously affected. He was able to go to his work this morning.

Indian Commissioners.—Hons. Wm. H. Walker and Llewellyn A. Luce, of Washington, D. C., Government Commissioners to the Crow Indians, arrived in this city yesterday, and left for the north to-day. They will visit the Crow Agency in Montana for the purpose of treating with the Indians regarding the right of way through their reservation for the Northern Pacific Railroad.

The Shooting Season.—Today is the first of the shooting season. The limitation prescribed by law having expired, sportsmen may now pepper away at game to their hearts' content. Thus, Wm. Jennings, Esq., was up Parley's Canyon this morning, but met with very little game in his rambles. He reports a cloud-burst at the Halfway House, and rooms filled with mud and water.

Several Reports.—We have received several reports of the 24th celebration in the settlements, which arrived to-day for publication. We thank our correspondents kindly for their communications, and are compelled to decline giving them publicity at this late day.

Another New Meeting House.—A meeting of the inhabitants of the Second Ward was held last Friday evening for the purpose of electing a building committee to take charge of the work of erecting a new ward meeting house. After prayer by Daniel Corbett, Bishop Samuel Peterson stated the object of the meeting, it having been decided at a previous gathering that the ward should build a new and more convenient house of worship. He stated that a piece of ground had been purchased for the site and asked the meeting to nominate a committee to superintend the contemplated structure. After several others had spoken upon the subject the following names were presented as members of the building committee: Samuel Peterson, sen., J. P. Olsen, N. C. Sorenson, P. E. Hansen and James Jensen. They were unanimously sustained by the meeting. E. F. Branting was chosen Secretary and Treasurer. A liberal subscription was made by those present. After benediction by James Leach, the assembly adjourned.

Burning Timbers.—The Leader of Friday says that for over two weeks a terrible fire has been raging in the timber near the U. O. Steam Mill, Logan Canyon, which is destroying precious stores of timber. This fire is doing damage to the U. O. of thousands of dollars. Its origin is unknown, but it is supposed to have started from a fire lighted by some careless person. It is estimated that at the very least there are ten acres of timber destroyed by fire in those mountains, to every acre that is cut down with the axe. There are numerous and extensive tracts of timber in the mountains east of Cache Valley, where the fires have been killed by fires that have swept through there within the last few years, since careless campers began to traverse them. The Leader wisely adds: "We think the Legislature ought to affix the severest penalties to carelessness of this kind, for to burn timber in the mountains is akin to the burning of public buildings or other property belonging to the people."
