**FOREST TREES.**—Here is a hint for legislators upon an important subject—

"A practical measure for encouraging the growth and cultivation of forest trees has been introduced in Maine, where a bill has been reported in the Legislature exempting from taxation lands devoted to that purpose for the period of twenty years. The amount of taxes that would be derived from such lands, if uncultivated, would be comparatively small; and yet the exemption is of sufficient importance to stimulate the cultivation of trees suitable for timber. Any plan which affords reasonable promise of encouraging the re-planting of forest trees is worthy of commendation, and it is to be hoped that the Legislature of other States will make efforts to accomplish the same end."

**LEGAL PROCEEDINGS IN UTAH.**—The following is from the Washington Globe, of the 22nd inst.—

Mr. Sargent. I ask the House to adopt the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Attorney General is hereby required to transmit to this House a statement of all criminal cases now pending, or brought within the last year, in the district courts of Utah Territory for crimes cognizable under the authority of United States laws, and also all civil actions in which the United States are concerned, and the cost and expenses incurred in the prosecution of such cases in said Territory, for which criminal cases have been drawn, and said criminal cases arrested, under authority of Congress, and by what authority, and the expenses of the law and usage of the Government in the prosecution of such criminal cases must be paid.

Mr. Holman. Is this a bill or a resolution? I only wish to get the facts. There being no objection, the resolution was adopted.

Mr. Sargent moved to reconsider the vote by which the resolution was adopted; and also moved that the motion to reconsider be laid on the table.

The latter motion was agreed to.
