CONVENTION DATE SET.

Utah Republicans to Gather Here May 7--- "Insurgents" Heard From.

As a result of the meeting of the Republican state committee yesterday afternoon, following an adjourned session from the morning, the official call was issued for a state convention to be held in the Sait Lake theater May 7,

After being requested to submit in writ-ing the demands of the sub-committee from John Q. Critchlow's committee of 15. Col. A. B. Irvine brought in the following

"In accordance with your request of this date, we respectfully submit the following, to be incorporated in the call for the Republican state convention to be held May 7, 1908. After stating the primary object of the call, we sug-gest that the following language be inserted: "In addition to the foregoing, the

"Said convention is also called for the purpose of discussing other ques-tions of party policy which now con-front the party in the State of Utah." "In the event that the foregoing does not meet with your approval, we sub-nit, as an alternative, the following: "The further business of said con-vention shall include discussion as to the propriety of recommending to the Republicans the adoption of a party policy that the state convention to be called for the selection of candidates for office shall nominate and declare its a shall nominate and declare its choice for United States senator, and, in addition to the above matters, shall embrace a discussion of the general party policy and questions now agitat-ing the minds of the Republicans of Utah, and deemed inimical to the wel-fare of the party in the approaching campaign." campaign.
