LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Home Again.—Mr. A. B. Taylor returned from his southern trip last evening, unbowed and hearty in appearance, and cheerful as his wont.

Visiting Friends.—Mr. William Dinwoody, Jr., of St. Louis, nephew to our fellow townsman, H. Dinwoody, Esq., and Messrs. James and John Needham, is spending a few days with his relatives in Salt Lake. Pleasant sojourn.

Free Lecture.—C. W. Stayner, Esq., will deliver his lecture on "The Pulpit, the Press and the People; the Pyramids of Power," in the Third Ward school-house, under the auspices of the Mutual Improvement Association of that ward, on Wednesday evening, December 3d. The lecture to commence at 7 o'clock.

Drunk and Disorderly.—Saturday afternoon, about 4.30 o'clock, a strange Catholic priest appeared upon the streets of Ogden, inebriated, and began threatening those he met with dire death with pistol or knife, as they chose. Marshal Brown soon captured him, and to-day he was taken before Justice Middleton, who assessed him enough to keep him in the Hotel de Brown for some time.—Dispatch.

Departing Missionaries.—Elder W. W. Jackson, of American Fork, Elder Burningham, of Wood's Cross, and Elder Nelson, of Willow Creek, left this morning on missions, the two former for Great Britain, the last to Scandinavia. Brother Burningham is the one who was arrested for bigamy, a few weeks ago—that is, on suspicion of having taken a plural wife—which was ignored by the Grand Jury, last week, and the defendant discharged for lack of evidence.

"Woman's Exponent."—The contents of the Exponent for December 1st, are as follows. King, "Advice to Young Ladies," "A few of my Thoughts," "Grain Meeting," "Primary Concert," etc., also correspondence, R. S. reports, Home Affairs, Notes and News, etc. The poetry consists of "Three Evening Shadows" by Millicent, and a poem by Mrs. Crocherson, entitled "I'm Weeping for My Daughter's Face."

Sunday School Meeting.—The monthly meeting of the Deseret Sunday School Union was held last night, December 1st, at the Fourth Ward Assembly Rooms. Assistant Superintendent George Goddard presiding. After the opening exercises, of singing by the First Ward Sunday school choir and prayer by Brother Martin Lenz, the roll of the Sunday schools of the city wards was called, all the being represented but the Fifth, being represented by the Fifth Ward. Superintendent Goddard then arose and said that this being a meeting of the superintendents and teachers, he wished them to consider it as such and feel free to occupy the time in giving their views as to the best way of conducting the Sunday schools, or anything else pertaining to their duties, so that all might be benefited in coming together.

No one immediately responding, Brothers Goddard, Willis and Marks sang the song "What are you Going to Do, Brother," after which Brother Willis arose and said that he did so to open the way, and then related the anecdote of Arnold Winkelried, the Swiss peasant, who, on the battle field, by grasping the spears of the opposing force and falling upon them opened the way (as he expressed it) to liberty.

Superintendent T. E. Taylor made some interesting remarks on the duties of teachers, and suggested that teachers read and study the lessons and chapters they intend their classes to read, before coming to the Sunday school, so that they might be prepared to explain them to their pupils.

Brothers John Alford, Levi W. Richards, John C. Cutler, and Stephen Marks, related some of their experience and observations in visiting the different Sunday schools; spoke highly of the improvement noticeable in them since their first visit, and of the kind feeling that was manifested between teachers and students.

Bishop Thorne felt gratified to see the interest taken in the Sunday school of the Seventh Ward, and mentioned that it was one of the first wards in the city to commence a Sunday school. He prayed God to bless all those engaged in the work, and particularly the children.

Supt. Goddard referred to the desirability of, having singing by the entire school, and asked how many schools had held a teachers' meeting since the last Union meeting. Eight Wards responded. When visiting the 7th Ward Sunday School last Sunday he had noticed a lack of teachers, but the bishop of the Ward had since called five teachers, who had come forward, and were blessed and set apart as Sunday School teachers last Sunday, at the evening meeting.

The office of a teacher had been held too cheap in the past, but the speaker thought they should be called, blessed and set apart as missionaries, for the work was just as important.

The superintendents were requested to send in their reports as early as possible, to Brother George Manwaring. The meeting was then adjourned for one month, at 7 o'clock.

Utah Stake Meetings.—Elder C. W. Penrose returned last evening from Utah County, whither he went on Saturday morning to attend the Utah Stake Conference. Part of the forenoon of that day was occupied by reading the Stake reports and sustaining the authorities, after which Elder Penrose addressed the meeting. In the afternoon Bishop R. T. Burton and Elder Joseph F. Smith occupied the time. Saturday evening, several of the party attended the joint session of the Improvement Associations in the Academy Hall, where, after Prof. Maeser had delivered his lecture on "Personal Characteristics of our Savior," Elder Penrose followed in some remarks on the same subject.

On Sunday morning, Elder Brigham Young and Joseph F. Smith addressed the Conference. Smith addressed the Conference, and on the afternoon of the same day President John Taylor delivered an interesting discourse. After meeting, the entire party, with President Smoot and others, rode over to Springville where a large assembly convened to listen to the words of the brethren. Yesterday morning the party proceeded to Spanish Fork, a meeting being held in the forenoon at which Elders Penrose, Smith and Young and President Taylor were the speakers. The party then divided, Elder Penrose coming home, President Smoot and Elder B. Young going to Salem and the others to Payson.

This morning the whole party were to go to Santaquin, President Taylor and Elder Smith will probably return to-night, while Elder Brigham Young and others, after visiting Goshen, Fairfield and Cedar Fort, will return home on Thursday.

U. S. Mineral Surveys.—Surveyor General Salomon has issued a circular letter to United States deputy mineral surveyors, informing them that the constant increase of mineral surveys renders it impossible for that office to furnish the necessary stationery for notes, plates, printing, diagrams, receipts, binding, etc., for surveys, out of the contingent fund appropriated for the use of the office; and that, henceforth, dating from December 1st, 1879, a deposit of \$2 for stationery will be required for each mineral survey. The charges for office work are as heretofore, viz: \$25 for each claim, and \$5 for each outfit, without limitation as to the number of the latter. The charges made are approved by the Hon. Commissioner's letter "E," of Nov. 22, 1879, received Nov. 30, 1879.

Haslup vs. Wardell.—The case of R. Haslup and W. Wardell, for engaging in a fight, Sunday before last, came up this afternoon before Justice Pyper. At the conclusion of the examination, it was evident that Wardell, in whipping Haslup, had acted in self-defense, and that the latter had insulted him repeatedly and even broken his cane upon him, before Wardell retaliated. The latter was therefore discharged and his opponent fined \$20.

Rowdiness.—Last evening, six young men were arrested for disorderly conduct on the streets, and this morning were interviewed by the police magistrate. Three of the party were fined \$5, \$10 and \$5 respectively, while the others were discharged. On leaving the presence of the Justice, they appeared very anxious that their names should not appear in the newspapers, and urged his Honor to have them suppressed; but the latter told them that it was a matter entirely beyond his control, and took advantage of the occasion to administer a little wholesome advice to the offenders, showing them the inconsistency and folly of their course of action, in first degrading themselves to the level of the common street drunkard and hoodlum, and then suddenly being stricken with remorse after it was all done, and expect and ask to be treated as gentlemen, neither having their names appear on the docket nor the least odium attaching to their names as a punishment. In other words, they were sorry not for having done wrong, but for being caught at it.

The police say they warned this squad of law breakers, two separate times the same evening, before taking them into custody, and each time they promised to desist from their unruly and boisterous conduct, but as many times failed to do as they had agreed, it's about time such things were stopped on our streets, and the police should not cease their efforts to keep peace and good order until the nuisance is fully abated.
