Latter-day Saint Mission
Home and Hall.

SEVENTY ELDERS FROM ZION

Met on Joyous Occasion—President
Heber J. Grant Offers Dedicatorial
Prayer.

Through courtesy of Prest. Anthon H.
Lund the "News" publishes the follow-
ing letter from Elder Andrew Jensen,
dated at Stockholm, Sweden, Oct. 24,
1904:

In company with President Heber J.
Grant and Christian D. Fjeldsted, I left
Copenhagen, Denmark, in the evening
of the 20th inst. (Thursday) and after
traveling all night we arrived in Stock-
holm on Friday morning at 9 o'clock.
On our arrival at the railway station
at Stockholm, we were met by Presi-
dent Anthon H. Skanck, who had
prevented us one week to Sweden hav-
ing gone to assist the brethren in
Stockholm in getting everything ready
for the dedication of the new mission
house. We took a cab at once and
drove to "Staden" where President
Grant and myself took rooms at Hotel
"Rosen" and thence walked to "Sod-
remalen" to Svansestegen No. 3, the
new mission property. As we looked
upon the face of the front building,
which in the renovation just completed
has received a handsome coat of cream-
colored paint, we were most favorably
impressed. It is indeed a fine property
for mission purposes and so centrally
and pleasantly situated that the people
from all parts of the city can con-
veniently attend meetings here. There
are two buildings on the property, one
four stories high, fronting the street,
and the other three stories high built
in the rear. Part of the two lower
stories of the front building, together
with an extension built in the rear
has been remodeled and turned into a
fine meeting hall which has a seating
capacity of about 600. To support the
two stories above (in the front build-
ing) six large steel pillars have been
built in the south end of the hall, they
also serve to support the gallery. The
stair is in the north end. The roof
above the gallery has been arched and
given the appearance of a church roof
of the ancient style. A baptismal font
is in course of construction in the rear
building. The premises is the second
property from Götavägen, one of the
principal business streets and
thoroughfares of that part of Stock-
holm, lying on the south side of the
water.

On our arrival at the mission
house we received a warm welcome
from Elder Charles J. A. Lindquist,
president of the Stockholm conference,
and other Elders laboring in the capital
as well as a number of others who had
come in to attend the dedicatory ser-
vices and the conference. We also
saw the premises full of workmen,
who were putting on the finishing
touches to different parts of the build-
ing, as everything must be ready for
the dedicatory services the next day.
In the evening of our arrival we at-
tended a concert given by the Stock-
holm branch choir under the direction
of Elder Gustaf L. Olsson. The pro-
gram consisted of vocal and instru-
mental music and declamations, and
some of the vocal numbers were ren-
dered most excellently. In the even-

ing of the next day Saturday, Oct.
22, about 600 people, among whom
nearly 70 Elders from Zion assembled
in the new hall. The services were
commenced at 8 p. m. After the open-
ing exercises President Anthon H.
Skanck made some appropriate open-
ing remarks, in which he gave a short
history of the building, and then
President Heber J. Grant offered the
dedicatory prayer in English, it was
taken down in shorthand by Elder
Elmer Johnson. Then followed short
speeches by Presidents Christian D.
Fjeldsted and Charles J. A. Lund-
quist. The opening prayer was offered
by Elder Karl A. Krantz, and the
dedication by Elder Andrew Jensen.
The musical numbers by the Stock-
holm branch choir were rendered with
an ability and spirit worthy of the
occasion.

On Sunday Oct. 23, a Sunday
school session was held in the morning,
and two general meetings in the after-
noon and evening. President Grant ad-
dressed the children in the forenoon
in English, followed by Presidents
Skanck and Fjeldsted in Norwegian and
Danish. The afternoon meeting
was addressed by Elders August Erik-
son, president of the Sundsvall confer-
ence, John J. Flomman, president of
Aalborg conference, Gilbert Thor-
gesen, president of Christiania confer-
ence, Andrew O. Ingelstrom, president of
Malmö conference, Andrew Eliasson,
president of Göteborg conference, and
Andrew Jensen. In the evening ses-
sion President Grant occupied most of
the time, delivering an excellent ad-
dress on the first principles of the
Gospel and the divine mission of the
Prophet Joseph Smith, Elder Karl A.
Krantz interpreted for him.

Today two excellent Priesthood meet-
ings were held; in the forenoon meeting
67 Elders spoke briefly, and in the after-
noon Elders Krantz, Fjeldsted, Lind-
quist, Jensen and Skanck delivered
short addresses, after which President
Grant spoke about two hours with
much freedom and with so much effect
under the influence of the Spirit of God,
that his hearers laughed one moment
and cried the next.

Throughout we have had a most ex-
cellent time, a veritable feast of rejoic-
ing—something well worthy the occa-
sion which has brought us together.
President Grant and myself expect to
leave here for Copenhagen tomorrow,
while Presidents Skanck and Fjeld-
sted will remain a little longer to at-
tend other meetings.

Oct. 25, 1904. Last night a Relief
Society conference was held in the
hall, at which satisfactory reports were
given of the five Relief Societies in
the Stockholm conference. President
Grant also delivered an address (inter-
preted by Elder Krantz) and Prest.
Skanck made a few remarks. After
the second Priesthood meeting yester-
day, Christian D. Fjeldsted was set
apart by President Heber J. Grant to
prelude over the Scandinavian mission,
to succeed Elder Anthon H. Skanck,
who will leave for home shortly.

Notes from the Foreign Mission Field.

President Lyon reports three bap-
tisms in South Africa during Septem-
ber, with prospects of more applicants
in the near future.

President Joseph H. Brinton writes
from Blackburn under date of Oct. 31,
1904: "I am pleased to report that the
labors of the Elders in the Liverpool
conference are being rewarded, and we
feel encouraged to continue diligently
searching for listeners to the Gospel
truth. We had the pleasure of bap-
tizing ten new members in the Barrow-
in-Furness branch, on Sunday, Oct. 23,
and we have applications from nearly
the same number in the Haslingden
and Rawtenstall branches, which we
have arranged to attend to on Nov. 6,
at Burnley baths; also in other branches
of the conference we have earnest
investigators, who, in the near future,
we expect to receive into the fold. On
Thursday, Oct. 27, we organized a Mu-
tual Improvement association in the
Nelson branch, with an enrollment of
seventeen. The officers are all local
members, under the direction of the
traveling Elders."

A district meeting was held Oct. 15,
1904, at Belfast. The attendance was
not large, but the Spirit of the Lord
was greatly enjoyed. President Bur-
gess also reports a successful district
meeting at Dublin, Oct. 25, where there
was a good attendance of Saints and
friends. Speaking of the Dublin branch,
he says: "The foundation for a strong
and substantial branch is certainly laid
here. Among the investigators are
several Germans, and we feel sure that
our 'German Colony' is destined to go
onward and upward. We have been
working hard trying to get a hall in
this city to hold our coming confer-
ence in, but thus far have been unsuccess-
ful. The people here are so bigoted
and narrow-minded, that they are
afraid the truth will be found out and
their crafts will be in danger. How-
ever, we have not given up yet, but in-
stead, to try every suitable place in the
city."
