# SEVENTY ELDERS FROM ZION

Meet on Joyous Occasion-President Heber J. Grant Offers Dedicatory Prayer.

Through courtesy of Prest. Anthon H. Land the "News" publishes the followlog letter from Elder Andrew Jenson, dited at Stockholm, Sweden, Oct, 24, 19041

In company with President Heber J. Grant and Christian D. Fjeldsted, I left Copenhagen, Denmark, in the evening of the 20th Inst. (Thursday) and after traveling all night we arrived in Stock-"folm on Friday morning at 9 o'clock. On our arrival at the railway station at Stockholm, we were met by Prestdent Anthon L. Skanchy, who had preceded us one week to Sweden havmg gone to assist the brethren in stockholm in getting everything ready for the dedication of the new mission house. We took a cab at once and drove to "Staden," where President Grant and myself took rooms at Hotel Reisen," and thence walked to "Sodremaion"-to Svartensgatan No 3, the new mission property. As we looked upon the face of the front building. which in the rennovation just completed has received a handsome coat of creamcolored paint, we were most favorably pressed. It is indeed a fine property that the Saints have secured here for mission purposes and so centrally and pleasantly situated that the people from all parts of the city can conlently attend meetings here. There are two buildings on the property, one four stories high. fronting the street, and the other three stories high built in the rear. Part of the two lower stories of the front building, (together with an extension built in the rear) has been remodeled and turned into a fine meeting hall which has a seating enpacty of about 600. To support the two rorles above (in the front building) six large steel pillars have been built in the south end of the hall, they also serve to support the gallery. The sland is in the north end. commenced at 8 p. m. After the open-ing exercises President Anthon Le Skanchy made some appropriate opening remarks, in which he gave a short history of the building, and then President Heber J. Then followed short speeches by Presidents Christian D. fieldated and Charles J. A. Lundquist. The opening prayer was offered by Elder Karl A. Krantz, and the benediction by Elder Andrew Jenson, The musical numbers by the Stock-holm branch choir were rendered with an ability and spirit worthy of the sceasion

On Sunday Oct. 23, a Sunday school session was held in the morning, and two general meetings in the after-noon and evening. President Grant addressed the children in the forenoon in English, followed by Presidents Skanchy and Fjeldsted in Norwegian and Danish. ings were held; in the forenoon meeting 67 Elders spoke briefly, and in the after-noon Elders Krantz, Fjeldsted, Lindquist, Jenson and Skanchy delivered short addresses, after which President Grant spoke about two hours with much freedom and with so much effect under the influence of the Spirit of God. that his hearers laughed one moment and cried the next. Throughout we have had a most ex-

cellent time, a verifable feast of rejoic-ing-something well worthy the occasion which has brought us together. President Grant and myself expect to leave here for Copenhagen tomorrow while Presidents Skanchy and Fjeldsted will remain a little longer to attend other meetings.
