Veto of Resolution for Paving Of Alleys up for Discussion.

URGED TO FORCE THE MATTER

Another Smoke Ordinance Passed-Stop Put to Laying Pipe by Sanitarium Company.

The members of the city council with one or two exceptions met last hight in the council rooms and discussed the ways and means for the proper governing of the municipal affairs entrusted to their care. The veto of the resolution for the paving of all alleys in the down town district received consider-

able comment. Councilman O'Donneil, who fathered the ordinance through the last meeting of the council, received permission to make the first talk in behalf of the movement. He said the mayor has large interests in the property along the proposed improvements and which will mean a considerable expenditure for him. "The alleys are a disgrace and menace to the beauty and health of Salt Lake." Councilman Fernström took the floor next and urged that the matter be forced. "The property hold-ers have laughed in our faces since the ordinance compelling the owners to close these alleys or have them paved by the first of October, was passed sev-eral months ago," said he. "They have done nothing nor will they until they see that the council means what it says. I for one am strongly in favor able comment. it says. I for one am strongly in favor of the movement."

VETO TABLED.

After much discussion by several of the members interested in the scheme it was decided to table the ordinance until the next meeting. A letter from the Commercial club was read, asking that the sources compared the next of that the council compel the paying of the down town alleys. The present condition is a nuisance and disgrace. Councilman Martin, after the adjourn-ment had been taken, voiced himself as going to make a test case of the matter. He will have warrants issued for the arrest of some of the property owners on a charge of allowing and per-mitting a public nuisance. The out-come will be watched with much inter-est. SMOKE ORDINANCE PASSED.

The smoke ordinance which has long been discussed at the council meetings was passed. This makes it compulsory for all owners of buildings within the city limits to put smoke consumers on their chimneys. All street restaurants and lunch counters were abolished by an ordinance passed last night. It will hereafter be a misdemeanor to cook or prepare lunch or food within 10 feet of the sidewalk. This has been before the council for the past two weeks and is to do away with feed stands in saloons.

PIPE LAYING STOPPED.
