A Spousal Stealing Case.—Business—Social and Amusement Notes.

Provo, April 20.—W. Anderson, the stranger who was charged with stealing his landlady's silver spoons, knives and forks and china, was tried in Justice Wedgwood's court yesterday afternoon.

Two silver dishes, found in the folds of a coat in the possession of the defendant, were identified by witnesses for the prosecution. One witness identified some silver teaspoons found in defendant's pocket, but the other witnesses were doubtful on this point as to whether the dishes were his. Defendant admitted that the china dishes belonged to Mrs. Miller, but could not explain how they came among his goods. He also admitted that he had been in the habit of taking a dish to her room with some pie or pudding for the little boy, but he had never seen all before leaving the house. There was some controversy as to the value of the dishes. Mrs. Miller stated that one of the dishes was worth \$125, while witnesses called in for the dishes placed its value at from \$9 to \$75, and of the other from \$25 to \$125. SUNDAY SCHOOLS AT THE TEMPLE DEDICATION.

Appointments for the Several Sunday Schools of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints by stakes and wards.

The following is the time when the Sunday Schools of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will be permitted to witness the Temple Dedication services of the Salt Lake Temple.

SAUNDAY, APRIL 21.

First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth wards of Salt Lake City.

Stake superintendents.—The schools of the following stakes are expected to be at the West gate of the Temple block at 10:30 a. m.: Utah, Tonia, Idaho, at 10:30 a. m.; Utah, Tonia, Summit, West and Utah, and the schools from other stakes not already mentioned. The reasons these latter schools are not mentioned is because no reports have been received up to this time.

The superintendent or representative of every school should be at the head of the school, with sufficient teachers for each eighth or ninth grade. The school should be kept together; also school from the same stake should be kept together and march to the west gate of the Temple block at the hour appointed.

To Sunday School Workers.

An invitation is hereby extended to all children now enrolled in the Sunday schools of Zion under 16 years of age. This invitation is especially extended to the children of the primary classes and those of the first and second intermediate grades. Arrangements will be made with the railroads to convey the schools to and from Salt Lake City at greatly reduced rates, of which due notice has been or will be given, as soon as the arrival and departure of trains and the time when the various schools are expected to be present. It is especially requested of the superintendents of the various schools that they equitably suitable persons to escort the children to and from their homes, so that none shall be lost, and to guard against accident.

Tickets of admission to the Temple will be issued to the children in the large Tabernacle in Salt Lake City on the day they visit the Temple, but each child must be accompanied by his or her teacher, or some responsible person, as being an enrolled member in the Sunday school, before a ticket of admission will be issued. These regulations are intended to supersede all previous suggestions and advice concerning this event; and it is hoped that the superintendents and teachers will exert themselves in carrying out the spirit and intent of the instructions here given.
