SCIPPIO, August 30, 1870.
Editor News.—I wrote this morning, too late I fear for to-day's mail; but my mind is so much occupied with tithing, telegraph, and other matters.

On reaching Nephi, yesterday p.m. we were greeted by the citizens, in goodly numbers. The brass band made us most excellent music. The people, wherever he goes, seem much rejoiced in seeing their veteran leader, and those who have and are laboring with him. The meeting last evening, was a good one. Many could not get into the house, so anxious were the people to listen to the inspiring counsels of the Presidency.

Bishop C. Peterson, from Ephraim, brought with him for the inspection and criticism of our master builder, Prest. Young, the projection on paper, of a fine sandstone meeting house they propose to immediately erect at that place. The old building was razed to the ground not long since to give place to a much larger, finer and in every way better edifice. The meeting house at Payson is now going up rapidly. These houses are much needed, as it is well known this people are pre-eminently a God worshipping people.

To-day we reached this place via Levan and over a new road from that place to the Sevier bridge, lying quite a distance east but parallel with the old Washboard road. There is much good land near the bridge that could be utilized to great advantage by spreading the fertile waters of the muddy Sevier over its surface. The first cost of getting out the water would be considerable, yet in due time the 3 cent places would return laden with a liberal interest on the investment.

Meeting 7 p.m. at this place. Elders Nephi Pratt, R. T. Burton and B. Young Jun., spoke very encouragingly, giving much practical instruction. Fillmore, Aug. 31.—Reached this place about 1 p.m. Halted a few minutes at Holden, alias Cedar Springs. The scholars were out to greet us welcome at that thriving stock, grain, and fruit-growing place.

At 3 p.m. met in general meeting with the people from most of the settlements of that place. House full, and met worthy and valuable counsels given. President Young, at the title of Saint is the greatest and most honorable title that can be bestowed on man. The gospel offers health for sickness, pleasure for sorrow, a dollar for a cent, peace and prosperity, for wars, anarchy, and distress, knowledge for ignorance, etc. The numerous spirits of the wicked dead are after the living good to deceive and mislead them, and are continually endeavoring to take their religious and moral props from under them. Let a mere child declare a fact or a truth to an intelligent and honest audience and it is believed; while it requires a great deal of talking, discussion and sophistry to make an untruth at all palatable. Our God has body, parts, passions, etc. It is easy for him to believe this. When he asked the Lord for a blessing it was naturally easy for him to believe that He has ears through which to hear, eyes through which to see, brains so as to comprehend, etc. "Mormonism" was true to the apostate. Jesus was the Savior of the world. The statement was efficacious and necessary to the apostate years ago when preaching the gospel, but now it is not true. Christ is not the Savior. The statement is not necessary say the same persons.

The President's remarks were replete with most excellent instructions. President Wells followed with many words of encouragement to the faithful and drew plain comparisons between the hesitating and those who are well grounded in the faith of the Gospel. At the conclusion of President Wells' remarks the meeting closed. Excellent singing.

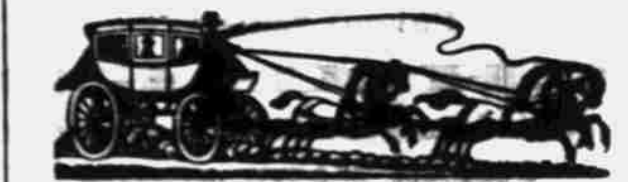

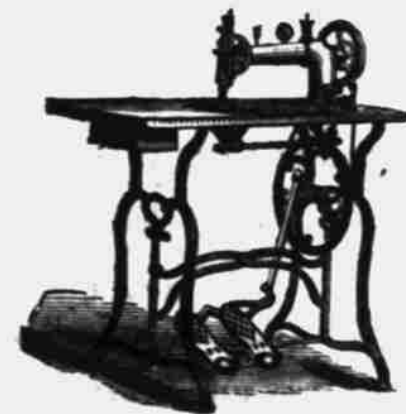
