DEEP WATER HARBOR.

The following from C. O. Whittemore of Los Angeles was read and adopted:

To the Honorable the Senate and. House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress Assembled:

Gentlemen. - We the undersigned Mayor and city recorder of the city of Sait Lake, Utah, have been instructed to forward to your honorable body the following resolutions adopted by the common council of said city upon the

common council of said city upon the—day of January, 1893.

Whereas, a duly constituted board of engineers of the United States has pronounced in favor of the feasibility and advisability of constructing a deep water harbor at San Pedro on the coast of Los Angeles county, Cal., which shail be capable of accommodating occangoing vessels of the largest draft; and Whereas, Such a harbor would afford the whole Territory of Utah and especially to the citizens and business interests of Salt Lake City, a nearer point of com-

of Salt Lake City, a nearer point of com-munication with the ocean and the com-mercial advantages which ocean transportation of fr ight affords; and

Whereas, The establishment of such a harbor will be a great benefit to the commerce of this Territory and this city;

Whereas, The beginning of the con-struction of such a harbor would im-mediately stimulate the develop-ment of railroad connection between this Territory and that point which would result in opening up to use and occupancy, a large portion of the finest coal and Iron lands in the Union, whose resources are at the pres-ent time unavailable for the lack of

transportation racilities; therefore be it Resolved, First, that the common council of Salt Lake does most respectfully petition the Congress of the United States to appropriate at its present States to appropriate at its present session the sum of at least \$500,000 for the purpose of commencing and prosecuting the work of construction of a deep wa'er harbor at the Mayor and city recorder of this city are hereby directed to forward to our Territorial delegate at Washington a cony of these resolutions to be lead before copy of these resolutions to be laid before Flied.
