DEEP WATER HARBOR.

The following from O. O. Whitmore of Los Angeles was read and adopted:

To the Honorable the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress Assembled:

Gentlemen.—We the undersigned Mayor and city recorder of the city of Salt Lake, Utah, have been instructed to forward to your honorable body the following resolutions adopted by the common council of said city upon the day of January, 1893.

Whereas, a duly constituted board of engineers of the United States has pronounced in favor of the feasibility and advisability of constructing a deep water harbor at San Pedro on the coast of Los Angeles county, Cal., which shall be capable of accommodating ocean-going vessels of the largest draft; and

Whereas, such a harbor would afford the whole Territory of Utah and especially to the citizens and business interests of Salt Lake City, a nearer point of communication with the ocean and the commercial advantages which ocean transportation of freight affords; and

Whereas, The establishment of such a harbor will be a great benefit to the commerce of this Territory and this city; and

Whereas, The beginning of the construction of such a harbor would immediately stimulate the development of railroad connection between this Territory and that point which would result in opening up to use and occupancy, a large portion of the finest coal and iron lands in the Union, whose resources are at the present time unavailable for the lack of transportation facilities; therefore be it

Resolved, First, that the common council of Salt Lake does most respectfully petition the Congress of the United States to appropriate at its present session the sum of at least \$500,000 for the purpose of commencing and prosecuting the work of construction of a deep water harbor at said point of San Pedro. Second, that the Mayor and city recorder of this city are hereby directed to forward to our Territorial delegate at Washington a copy of these resolutions to be laid before

the Senate or House committees on rivers and harbors.

CITY PRISON BIDS.

PRESIDENT LOOFBJUROW

called the meeting to order as follows:

Gentlemen:—This is a sort of informal meeting of the City Council and certain other business men to discuss certain propositions which are agitating the public mind, the nature of which you know perhaps fully as well as not better than myself. The meeting will not go upon record as a regular session. I now await your pleasure.

Lawson—I move that the chairman of the special committee of the copper plant be allowed to address us.

Colonel Donnellan—As chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee I first beg leave to read the following:

Whereas, An effort is being made by the enterprising business men and citizens of Salt Lake City to raise the sum of \$100,000 by personal subscription, besides a sum sufficient to purchase 160 acres of land—all to be donated to parties proposing to locate copper reduction works in or near our city; and

Whereas, Said works will cost not less than \$500,000, and will give employment to not less than 300 skilled operatives, said plant to include a copper smelter, a separate establishment for refining copper matte which will be drawn from Butte, Mont., Durango, Col., and other points. Also an establishment for the parting of gold and silver from the base metals and for the manufacture of copper
