This shows a total increase of \$46,040 41 over the appropriation of 1890. An analysis of the appropriations will show where the court may expect a decrease or increase during 1892. There were appropriations in 1891 to road account to the amount of \$4923 23, which were to meet bills incurred in 1890. There are now paid or on file in this office claims for work done in 1891 amounting to \$4970.38. This would leave a balance in favor of appropriations to this account in 1892 of \$852.85, if no more work is done on roads than has been done during the year just closed. The appropriations for inquests will not vary greatly. There will be no appropriation to sewer account, as that work is finished, thus effecting a saving of \$8332.35. The chief expense in the jail account was rendered necessary by connecting the same with the main sewer. If there are only the usual expenses for repairs the appropriation to this account ought not to exceed \$300, a decrease of \$912.80. In the pauper and insane account the expense cannot be estimated, as the cost of relieving the needy depends upon so many contingencies which cannot be foreseen. But certainly no great increase need be apprehended if times remain fairly good. Criminal expense cannot increase much under the present law. Though the appropriation for stationary, books and supplies for offices must grow with the population and consequent increase of business, I do not apprehend that there will be any material increase in 1892. There was considerable extra expense incurred in providing the Assessor's and Collector's offices last year which will not be necessary this year. Expense account—It cost the county \$6726.70 to provide the assessor and collector with the abstract maps required by law and to make them ready for the assessment and collection of 1892. They probably can be brought up to January 1, 1893, for \$1200, thus making a saving of \$5527.70 in the matter. An appropriation of \$1500 was made to the Irrigation Congress and is in the nature of an extraordinary expense. I estimate there will be a decrease of \$400 in the expense for office furniture, so that the expense account will probably show a decrease of \$7500. The appropriations to the courthouse and land account will depend upon the progress of the city and county building. If the county proceeds with the proposed addition to the infirmary, there will be an increased expense here. It is now impossible to estimate how much of the county's revenue will be absorbed by sales to the probate judge account delinquent taxes, but the increase, amounting to \$7707.91 in 1891, was so great that probably the amount in 1892 will not exceed that of 1891. Prison Account.—This, like the pauper account, cannot be estimated, but probably will increase with the population.

Relief account does not vary much from year to year. Compensation Account—There was an increase of \$9995.53 in 1891 in this account. Of this amount \$4751 was made necessary by the law of 1890 providing for taking the census and collecting statistics. It cost the amount to do this work. There was an increase of \$500 in the salary of the assessor and of \$375 in that of the collector. There was an increase of salary to the sheriff of \$370.30, and the increase will amount to \$1200 during 1892. The salary of the fish and game commissioner was increased \$50. The appropriation to the surveyor for 1891 shows an increase of \$1123.70 over 1890. The salary of other officers has remained the same. The pay of officers no salaried varies with the number of days' service rendered. Therefore, unless the Legislature repeals or modifies the law requiring statistics to be collected and the census to be taken, no great change will be looked for in this account. Then, if the work on roads necessitates an outlay greater than that of 1891, there will be a decrease about as follows:

ASK TO BE ANNEXED.

Gentlemen:—We the undersigned, constituting no less than two-fifths of the property owners within the following boundaries, to wit: Commencing at the intersection of Fifth East and Roper streets, thence south on said Fifth East street to the north line of lot 7, block 3, five-acre plat A, thence east to a point due south from the southeast corner of the present corporate limits of Salt Lake City, thence north to the said southeast corner of the present limits of Salt Lake City, thence west to place of beginning, hereby respectfully petition your honorable body to extend the corporate limits of Salt Lake City so as to include the above described territory.
