Increase in 1892. There was considerable extra expense incurred in providing the Assessor's and Collector's offices last year which will not be necessary this year. Expense account—It cost the county \$6726.70 to provide the assessor and col-lector with the abstract maps required by law and to make them ready for the salector with the abstract maps required by law and to make them ready for the as-sessment and collection of 1892. They probably can be brought up to January 1, 1893, for \$1200, thus making a saving of \$5527.70 in the matter. An appropria-tion of \$1500 was made to the Irrigation Congress and is in the nature of an ex-traordinary expense. I estimate there will be a decrease of \$400 in the expense fur office furniture, so that the expense account will probably show a decrease of \$7500. 76 72

It is now impossible to estimate now much of the county's revenue will be ab-sorbed by sales to the probate judge ac-count delinquent taxes, but the increase, amounting to \$7707.91 in 1891, was so great that probably the amount in 1892 will not exceed that of 1891.

Prison Account. This, like the panper account, cannot be estimated, but prob-ably will increase with the population.

Relief account does not vary much from year to year. Compensation Account—There was an increase of \$9995.53 in 1891 in this ac-count. Of this amount \$4751 was made necessary by the law of 1890 providing for taking the census and collecting sta-tistics. It cost the amount to do this work. There was an increase of \$500 in the salary of the assessor and of \$375 in that of the collector. There was an inthat of the collector. There was an in-crease of salary to the sheriff of \$370.30, and the increase will amount to \$1200 during 1892. The salary of the fish and game commissioner was increased \$50.
