AS THE WORLD GOES.

The Defendants in the Panama Trial to be Heard.

BOOTH PRACTICALLY DEAD.

Failure Announced.—The Trial of Little Boston—Utah Trust and Savings Bank Begged.

PANAMA, June 6.—The Coöperative states that the court of cassation, to which Charles De Losage and associates appealed from the sentence passed upon them for corruption in the management of the affairs of the Panama Canal company, will award the sentence in order to release the defendants. This statement is in accord with the report current for some time to the effect that great efforts, justifying the conclusion that the assessors have developed in connection with the protection of the Panama case.

PRACTICALLY DEAD.

Bulletin on Mr. Booth's Condition Today.

New York, June 6.—The Spanish princess arrived here this morning saying that there is no change in her condition since last night and that she had a comfortable sleep. Monday, Booth's sleep was extremely poor, the night and interrupted by an exciting fit of coughing. It is not thought possible that he can live longer than till midnight, if that long. Already he is practically dead, being entirely confined to a bed, barely breathing with much difficulty.

FAILED TODAY.

An Eastern Publishing House Makes no Assignment.

BOSTON, June 6.—Peter and Potter, publishers of the New England Magazine, Yankee Blouse, Human's Journal and other periodicals have made an arrangement. The total assets are \$75,000 to \$100,000. The firm remains the same up to last Friday, when the partners have passed their lips for days.

HONEY GIVING WEST.

At the substation it was stated that there is a movement of currency to the interior in very heavy sums. Today \$1,000,000 in small notes were remitted by the New York banks.

PHILADELPHIA, June 6.—Samuel F. Price, president of the New England Works here and partner of Andrew Bauer, Vermon, has failed. The liabilities are \$100,000, the actual assets, a quarter of a million.

A NEW YORK BANK.

New York, June 6.—A notice on the door of the defunct Canfield bank this morning informed the chancing crowd of depositors that the bank was in the possession of the commissioners and that the bank had gone into liquidation and the depositors would be paid in full.

THE STOCK STORE.

Effects of an Few Weeks Spoken by President Cleveland.

New York, June 6.—The stocks opened strong and higher on President Cleveland's statement to an Associated Press reporter on the financial situation and the proposed extra session of Congress.

The early advance was induced by resolutions under which a general decrease was ordered to \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000. Northern Pacific preferred, 100,000,000 general electric, 100,000,000. The little stocks, subsequently a few cents lower and prices went higher than before, Western Union selling up to \$100,000,000. Denver & Rio Grande, preferably, 100,000,000. At the market close, the stocks were down.

The operation was then set at 11, and the day was continued, with higher prices established for many shares, notably sugar and Southern Pacific, preferred. London was a large buyer of specialties. At noon the market was seen at or near the top figure.
