CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 25.—Cockrell sub-

mitted a resolution directing the

commissioner of agriculture to fur-

nish the Senate such information

and facts as may be in his posses-

sion in regard to the carrying of

and to diseases of animals gener-

ally, with such suggestions as he

may deem pertinent. Agreed to.

Heck called up his resolution de-

claring it inconsistent to impose

taxes at this time for the purpose

of providing for a sinking fund,

and directing the Secretary of the

Treasury not to purchase any bonds

for the reduction of the principal

of the national debt until further

orders from Congress.

relating to the execution of the

senate went into executive session,

and when the doors were reopened

adjourned.

HOUSE.
