

DESERTED WIFE AND CHILDREN

Rev. Wallace M. Stuckey in Illinois Jail Charged With Abducting Lorena Sutherland.

WAS BRUNETTE, NOW BLONDE

Introduced Her as His "Daughter," But Suspicion Was Soon Aroused.

Western, Ill., Sept. 16.—Rev. Wallace M. Stuckey, pastor of the Christian church of Williamsburg, Kan., and pastor of the Williamsburg Star, is charged in the county jail on the charge of having abducted Lorena Sutherland, 15-year-old daughter of a wealthy farmer of Williamsburg, from her home. The girl, originally a brunette, but now a blonde, also is in custody. She will be returned to her parents and to act as a witness against the accused preacher.

The principal feature of the case is the fact that Rev. Jero Knapp, pastor of St. George's Episcopal church, Long Island, N. Y., who deserted his wife and children, and fled to San Francisco with Lorena Sutherland. The accused preacher, who had been pastor of the Williamsburg church for six months, disappeared from Williamsburg July 12 last, deserting his wife and four young children. Two weeks later the Sutherland girl disappeared and it is now known that she fled with her hair in an effort to disguise herself.

The first of her troubles occurred when Stuckey was struck by a Chicago street car and suffered the fracture of the right arm. When he recovered he was reduced to the point of starvation. Stuckey tried playing a concert at a cheap Chicago theater and then came to Williamsburg to work in a brass band. He brought Miss Sutherland with him, introducing her as his daughter, calling himself Mr. Morgan. The relations of the "father" and "daughter" arranged through Sheriff Griffin arrested the pair.

SHERIFF WANTS STUCKEY

Western, Kan., Sept. 15.—Sheriff W. P. Lattin of Franklin county left Topeka today for Springfield, Ill., with a requisition for Rev. W. M. Stuckey, who is under arrest at Williamsburg, Mo. Stuckey is charged with abducting Miss Lorena Sutherland, a 15-year-old girl from Williamsburg, Kan. Stuckey deserted his wife and four children. The couple have been missing six months.

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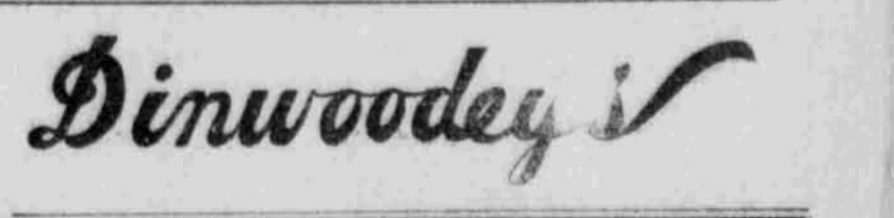
