PAN AMERICAN RAILROAD OF CENTRAL AMERICA

Los Angeles, Cal. Sept. 16.—Within 21 hours of the publication that Ambussader Thompson, the American representative in Mexico, had practically closed the purchase of the Pan-American railroad of Mexico, comes the anouncement today that J. M. Necland and the group of capitalists who sold the Mexican line to Thompson have hunched the Pan-American railroad of Central America to connect the Panama canal with Moxice.

Ambassador Thompson's option on the Pan-American in Mexico calls for a purchase price of 10 millions gold. The new corporation, according to Necland, will be copitalized at \$50,009,000. The Central American line will extend from the Guatemalan frontier to the Panama canal, a distance of 1,400 miles.
