

Apostle Thatcher's Arrest.

Last evening about ten o'clock Apostle Moses Thatcher was arrested on the charge of unlawful cohabitation. Deputies Steele and Whetstone went to his residence, Whetstone to the front and Steele to the back door. Whetstone knocked and enquired if Mr. Thatcher was home, and was answered by George F. Thatcher in the affirmative. Mrs. Thatcher approached the door and invited the deputy into the house. Hearing the conversation Mr. Thatcher appeared in view, when the deputy asked "Is this Mr. Thatcher?" The answer was, "Yes, sir," and the deputy was asked his name and business. The reply was that his name was Whetstone, and that he had a commission on the warrant. Mr. Thatcher then asked him to step to the light and read the warrant, which he did. Deputy Steele then called by Deputy Whetstone, came in and subpoenaed some members of the family as witnesses. Mr. Thatcher then went with the deputies to the Commissioner's office, and gave bonds in the sum of \$2,000 for his appearance for examination on Friday morning. He also gave bonds for the appearance of the alleged second wife, Mr. Geo. W. Thatcher and Aaron F. Farr, Jr. signed the bonds. Aaron F. Farr, Jr. was subpoenaed as a witness in the case.

This morning the news of the arrest rapidly spread. It was not very much of a surprise to many of Mr. Thatcher's friends here for it has been rumored for some time that there was a commissioner's warrant out for him and he has frequently been seen of late on the streets and other places, and on last Sunday evening he preached at the evening meeting in the First Ward. The result of his examination will be waited with considerable interest.—*Evening Journal, Sept. 5.*

THE JURY'S VERDICT.

The Killing of Stokes Found to be Without Provocation.

At 6 p.m. Sept. 3rd the coroner's inquest resumed the inquiry into the killing of Charles Stokes by Baliff McManamy. Mr. Rench was there and gave his testimony as follows: I was walking up Main Street at about 9 o'clock on Saturday night, and upon reaching the Wasatch Building heard some kind of a row in the hall. I went and saw three or four men there; two of them were scuffling as I went in to part them, and while thus engaged the deceased caught me by the throat and began choking me. McManamy came to my assistance. Stokes was quite a powerful man and very quick; he pushed McManamy with his shoulder but did not strike him. After getting him under control I started out, and told him that he was under arrest for resisting an officer. He struggled considerably, but some one came up and said I was a deputy, after which he walked quietly along. Commissioner Sorrell, who was also present, told McManamy to go along and assist me. Upon reaching the street north of the Wasatch building, however, I ordered him to go back and supposed he did. When we were near to the drug store Stokes asked me what I was going to do with him. I replied that I would take him to the City Hall. He said he did not want to be disgraced, and to avoid trouble, I took him in Smith's drug store with the intention of telephoning for the police, and had just asked Mr. Smith to telephone when the first shot was fired. I turned, and being very much startled, released the prisoner. McManamy was standing close to us with a revolver in his hand. He thrust his pistol right up against Stokes and fired two more shots. Until the first shot was fired, I had no idea that McManamy was present; I don't know why he shot. Stokes was my prisoner and McManamy had no authority to make an arrest.

The jury then consulted for a few moments, and then returned a verdict that the deceased, Charles Stokes, died in A. C. Smith & Co.'s drug store, on East Temple Street, in Salt Lake, on 9:30 p.m. on September 1st, A.D. 1888, from the effects of a pistol shot fired by the hand of McManamy, without any just provocation.

In conversation yesterday afternoon, a deputy marshal stated that he saw McManamy thirty minutes before the shooting, and saw that he was then under the influence of liquor; he was not drunk, but had sufficient intoxicants in him to make him offensive. The rumor was current today that a plea of insanity was set up as a defense, and in mitigation of the killing.

SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION.

Interesting Matter Relative to Sabbath School Work.

The regular meeting of the officers and teachers of the Sabbath Schools of this Stake was held in the Social Hall, Monday evening, Sept. 3, 1888, Supt. John C. Cutler presiding.

The meeting was well attended, and nearly all the city wards and several of the country wards were represented. The opening and closing exercises were given by the Sixteenth Ward, led by Brother John Vincent. Opening prayer was offered by Supt. Peter Gillespie.

After the reading of the minutes, Elder Joseph W. Summerhays gave a brief description of the theological class of the Sixteenth Ward School,

and of the manner in which it is conducted. Lessons were usually chosen which had a direct bearing upon the first principles of the Gospel. The purpose of the teachers of the class was to do but little talking themselves, but have the members of the class occupy most of the time. At present the class was studying the "Key to Theology." Each chapter was dwelt upon until all who chose had an opportunity to either lecture or read an original essay on the lesson afforded in each chapter. After the chapter had been thoroughly discussed, some prominent Elder had been invited to deliver a lecture upon the subject of the chapter. Thus thoroughness was characteristic of every lesson taken up by the class. The attendance of the class ranged from 75 to 100 each Sabbath.

The congregation sang, "Zion prospers, all is well," led by Brother Thos. McIntyre.

ELDER A. S. GEDDES

gave a very interesting summary of his methods of conducting the primary class of the Sixteenth Ward School. The teaching was given orally, in the form of catechizing, illustrated by charts. In commencing his work in the class he had great difficulty in finding lessons which were adapted to the children of a tender age. He got over the difficulty by formulating a catechism for his own use, and had met with considerable success. He had taken the class through a great part of the history of the Bible, had taught them the first principles of the Gospel, also the duties of members, and was now instructing them in the duties of Deacons and Teachers. No lesson was discontinued till the children were quite familiar with it.

The speaker urged the great need of our Sunday Schools being graded, so that a thorough and systematic course of instruction could be given in all our schools. To effect this our houses of public worship should be built with ample facilities for accommodating the Sunday Schools, by affording a separate room for each class. Order and proper decorum could then be better maintained and one teacher could take care of twice the number that are now allotted to a class.

Assistant Superintendent R. S. Horne who has been absent on a visit to England, gave a brief and interesting outline of his travels.

Benediction was offered and the meeting adjourned till October 1st. The congregational pieces to be sung then are "Love at Home" and "Did you think to pray." The Seventeenth Ward school will furnish part of the programme at the next meeting.

General Sheridan was opposed to the usual above-ground fortifications for defensive purposes. He said: "Give me the guns and I will find a hole to put them in; for a good hole is the best fortification I know of." General Sheridan frequently declared that expensive armored forts were wholly unnecessary for the defense of a country. It was his fixed opinion that the fighting of the future must be done mainly from underground. The building of forts above the surface where the enemy's heavy guns could hammer them to pieces did not meet with his approval. Pits in the earth where gunners and guns could lie hidden together were the only forts which he would recommend. A gun in an underground burrow could readily be lifted above the surface by hydraulic power, discharged at the enemy, and then dropped out of sight again. To destroy such a fortress it would be necessary to tear up the earth.

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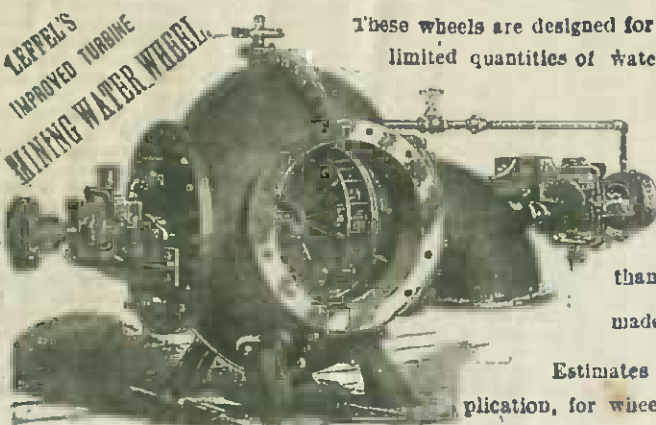
