It will also be necessary for the company to run another line from its plant down to Lehi and then down to the pumping station, distance of about ten miles These

improvements will cost in the neighbor-hood of \$30,000. Haywood and Grey of Salt Lake City have been retained by the company as consulting engineers. The General Electric company of Schenectady, N. Y. have the contract for the new 250 K. W. generator, and the same will be shipped in a few days. The Pelton Wheel company of San Francisco, Cal., will supply the two 500 H. P. water wheels. The contract
