LOCAL BRIEFS.

The local Bartenders' union has been granted a charter by the general body.

A party of globe trotting tourists are at the Knutsford en route to their homes in Tasmania.

The local shoe cobblers organized a union last night, with Henry Harms president and J. C. Edgar, secretary.

Peter Knudsen, formerly of Denmark, now of Park City, was admitted to citizenship yesterday by Judge Lewis of the district court.

J. F. Jensen of Mt. Pleasant has sold to Porter & McMillan of Blackfoot 20 head of yearling Rambolet lambs exhibited at the state fair at \$20 per head.

A meeting will be held this evening at the Kenyon hotel to organize an association of the Sons of Confederate veterans. Lieut.-Gen. Alford of Dallas will preside.

The Twin Falls company is to operate large marina launches on the grand canal, and small pleasure yachts and launches will be placed on the Seven Miles Lake above the dam.

Court Clerk James announces that the registration supplier for the municipal elections, to be held in the cities of this county on Nov. 3, will be ready for distribution at his office on Saturday, Oct. 10, and registrars are requested to call for the same.

At a meeting of the Democratic city committee, held at the office of Morris Sonner last evening, it was reported that the city convention would be held in the Grand Theater, that building having been secured by the committee. District reports were made and other routine business transacted.

Manager Campbell of the Light & Power company remarked this evening that he had been getting along with superstitious pols in this city and would consolidate with the Bell Telephone company on other poles, so that the number in town will be considerably reduced.

The roster of Troop A will be increased to its regulation limit at an early date, now that its staff of commissioned officers is complete, and the boys say the troop will not only be quickly filled up, but there will be a lot of names placed on the waiting list. The members of the troop propose to make an imposing appearance on the occasion of the next parade.

The street car company is making over Rand Transit cars 21 and 29 into vestibules for use the coming winter. Double truck car No. 32 is just out of the paint shop, and is being equipped with double deck motors. There are now five big cars of this class, regular mountain climbers, and three of them are being operated on the Sixth street line. They are Nos. 31, 32, 33, 35 and 46, all equipped with air brakes and sand boxes.

The Salt Lake Florists' society held its first annual banquet last night at the Commercial club. The dining hall was profusely decorated in roses, carnations, palm greens, and the general effect was very pleasant. Twenty-five members of the society and their spouses were present among the guests being Hon. Fisher Harris, C. A. Erickson, A. J. Davis and John Reading. The banquet was a five-course affair with wine and cigars.

B. H. Fairbanks, the well known artist, has opened a fine exhibit of his works at the Memorial building of the L. D. S. University. The display which will be maintained for two weeks, contains all the paintings made by him of gleaning subjects while on his trip to South America, with the B. Y. academy exploration expedition, as well as a large collection of other paintings and photographs. Altogether the exhibit is an interesting one and can be viewed with profit.

remarked today that his town was progressing in a most marvelous manner. The real estate values were soaring away up in the reality firmament.
