LOCAL BRIEFS.

The local bartenders' union has been granted a charter by the general body.

A party of globe trotting tourists are at the Knutsford en route to their homes in Tasmania.

The local shoe cobblers organized a union last night, with Henry Harns president and J. C. Edgar, secretary.

A meeting will be held this evening at the Kenyon hotel to organize an association of the Sons of Confederate Veterans. Lieut. Gen. Alfred of Dallas will preside.

The Twin Falls company is to operate large naptha launches on the grand canal, and small pleasure yachts and launches will be piced on the Seven Miles Lake above the dam.

County Clerk James announces that the registration notices for the municipal elections, to be held in the cities of this county on Nov. 3, will be ready for distribution at his office on Saturday, Oct. 10, and registrars are requested to call for the same.

At a meeting of the Democratic city committee, held at the office of Morris Summer last evening, it was reported that the city convention would be held in the Grand Theater, that building having been secured by the committee. District reports were made and other routine business transacted.

Manager Campbell of the Light & Power company remarked this morning that he had for some time been "pulling out" superfluous poles in the city and would consolidate with the Bell Telephone company on other poles, so that the number in town will be considerably reduced.

The roster of Troop A will be increased to its regulation limit at an early date, and the staff of commissioned officers is complete, and the boys say the troop will not only be quickly filled up, but there will be a lot of names placed on the waiting list.

The members of the troop propose to make an imposing appearance on the occasion of the next parade.

The street car company is making over Rapid Transit cars 21 and 29 into vestibules for use the coming winter. Double truck car No. 32 is just out of the paint shop, and is being equipped with quadruple motors. There are now five big cars of this class, regular mountain climbers, and three of them are being operated on the sixth street line. They are Nos. 31, 32, 33, 35 and 40, all equipped with air brakes and sand boxes.

The dining hall was profusely decorated in roses, carnations, palm greens, and the general effect was very pleasing. The banquet was a five-course affair with wine and cigars.

MORMONISM IN BUTTE.

Meetings Addressed by Presidents Nephi Pratt and Seymour B. Young.

The Butte-Butte-Mountain says: That Mormonism has come to Butte to stay, was exemplified yesterday in the two enthusiastic meetings held by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, one in the afternoon at 902 Utah avenue, and the other in Good Templars' hall on West Broadway, in the evening.

The services were notable for the prominence of those who addressed the meeting, they being Dr. Seymour B. Young and Nephi Pratt. Mr. Young is first president of the Seventies of the Church in Salt Lake, and Mr. Pratt is president of the Ninth Ward mission. These gentlemen were accompanied by Elder A. L. Beck of Paris, Idaho, and Martin Winter of Montpelier, Idaho.

President Pratt first addressed the evening service, and was followed by Mr. Young. He took for his theme the Prophet Joseph Smith and his work, and argued to prove that his preaching was the result of a direct communication with God, and that such revelations were necessary in order to arouse the people of this age to action.

He said that Joseph Smith is no obscure man, but a man who has been launched by his doctrines upon the world, and it was natural for him to receive the same persecutions that Christ did.

Dr. Young then took up the thread where Mr. Pratt left off and prefaced his remarks with the statement that Joseph Smith was a messenger of God to this world, and that he was with the Father and the Son. He dwelt at length upon the work and object of the Church and explained its mission in the world. He held that Abraham, Isaac and Jacob had been brought about the prophecies of Joseph Smith in the war of the Rebellion.

Butte has come to an important mission of the Mormon Church and much attention is being devoted to the work being done by the missionaries located here.

GIVES MORAN TWO MORE WEEKS.

Council Committee Deals Gently With Delinquent Paying Contractor.

CHAIRMAN CLAWSON OBJECTED

Favored Taking the Contract Away From Him and Awarding it to City Improvement Co.

The streets committee of the city council, at its meeting last night, decided to give P. J. Moran two more weeks to secure his paying plan and begin work on repaving and resurfacing the street paving, pursuant to his contract of several months ago.

Mr. Moran was present and stated that he had been unable to secure a paving plant heretofore but that he has now purchased one and the machinery will be here in a few days. He was certain that he would be ready to commence the work within two weeks, so he was granted until that time to do so.

Chairman Clawson strongly opposed an extension of time. He said that many complaints were heard every day about the deplorable condition of the paving and he favored taking the contract out of Moran's hands and awarding it to the City Street Improvement company at five cents per square yard less than Moran's bid.

Inasmuch as the company had had an opportunity to bid the contract before it was awarded to Moran and his bid had been exorbitant, the committee did not think that it should be allowed to come now and ask for an extension of time.

NEW PLUMBING ORDINANCE.

The committee on municipal laws considered the new plumbing ordinance for a brief time. A number of plumbers were present and offered various suggestions as to matters that should be contained in the ordinance.

Another hearing on the ordinance will be had before the committee finally reports.

HAND VS MACHINE.

When the matter of purchasing a new street sweeper came up before the committee on streets, the question was again raised as to whether it would be better to employ a force of men to sweep the street or to purchase a machine. It was stated by City Engineer Kelsey that all of the large eastern cities have adopted the hand brigade method for cleaning the streets.
