WEATHER DURING WEEK.

Bulletin Issued Shows Low Temperature Prevailed Throughout State.

The weather bulletin for the week ending May 27, is as follows:—Cool weather prevailed during the week, the temperature averaging slightly below the normal. The distribution of the temperature deficiency over the state was quite equable. Fair warm weather prevailed during the early part of the week, the temperature averaging considerably above the normal, but about the middle of the week, cold, cloudy weather set in and continued with high wind, and some scattered frosts. The change from the warm weather of the early part of the week to the cold of the latter part was much greater in the northern half of the state than in the southern.

The precipitation was unevenly distributed over the state during the week, being quite heavy over the northern half of the state, and considerably less in the southern, a few stations reporting no rain. The heaviest rain fell in the higher districts of the northern portion, the depth ranging from one to seven inches on the morning of the 24th. This wet, heavy snow did considerable damage. Without exception the rain set in generally over the state on the evening of the 23rd, and continued almost all of the 24th, and in places continued into the 25th. High water was general in the streams during the warm weather early in the week, but the waters generally fell during the cold weather of the latter half of the week. The high winds that swept over the state generally nearly every day of the week, did some slight local damage. The percentage of the possible amount of sunshine during the week, was below the usual amount, averaging about 50 per cent. At the beginning of the week the full possible amount of sunshine, prevailing throughout the state, but it decreased rapidly towards the latter part.

VETERINARY EXAMINERS.

Governor Culler Appoints Members of State Board Today.

Governor Culler today issued a proclamation appointing members of the state board of veterinary examiners, which was created by the recent legislature. The members of the board are Dr. John Krist, Dr. N. C. Spaulding, Jr., and Dr. P. Parker. The duties of the board are to examine all veterinary surgeons who desire to practise in this state as to their qualifications and issue certificates to them.

TESTING THE CONCRETE.

Interesting Experiment Under Way at Railroad Exchange Building.

An interesting test of the strength of reinforced concrete is being made in the cellar of the new Railroad Exchange building, at Third South and Main streets. Two hundred and sixty-four sacks of cement, weighing 25,000 pounds, are piled up on a platform of reinforced concrete, 18x14 feet, in area and 12 inches thick. The deflection in consequence of this test is only three-eighths of an inch. The weight is to be increased to 50,000 pounds by the addition of brick.

TELEPHONE STRIKE.

Executive Committee of Men Meets With Officials of Federation.

The telephone strike refuses to produce any new developments, with the exception of the fact that telephone service refused to go out of commission, despite the efforts of the strikers to have the company "come through" with an offer of higher wages, or confess the need of the strikers in maintaining only a crippled service.

The executive committee of the strikers met with officials of the Federation of Labor today and discussed the position of extending more positive aid and assistance than that which has been offered. It may be that this conference may result in bringing the situation to some kind of a conclusion in which the present deadlock will be broken. Manager Louis Lynn still declares that the strikers are staying out all over the district, in spite of reports that they are returning in various localities.

CROOKS ARRAIGNED.

WORKING FOR KEARNS.

Explanation of His Occupation Made By Prisoner at City Jail.

Two boys who tried to gain their freedom after being committed to the state industrial school at Ogden, are now on their way back to the institution, the second of them having been located and placed under arrest this morning. Deputy Sheriff Ike Emery and A. W. Smith located the youngster, Harry Bates, at the home of Mrs. Craig in Ogden. When they arrived at the home, Mrs. Craig was not at all disposed to give the boy up, and denied that he was there. A search of the house, however, succeeded in locating him under a bed, but it was not made until Mrs. Craig had been informed that resistance on her part could be followed by her arrest. The other of the two boys who escaped, Eberhart, was located yesterday and confined in the county jail.

AM. BOND RESERVE CO.

Judge Littlefield Finds Merger of Several Companies Was Fraudulent.

Kansas City, May 30.—Judge Walter Littlefield, special master in chancery, appointed to take evidence, announced today that he is ready to make a report of his findings in the investigation into the merger of the American Bond Reserve company.

That the merger of the several companies was a fraudulent transaction, and that the proceeds of the sale of the bonds of the fund deposited with the state treasurer of Missouri should be distributed pro rata among the creditors of the several companies, no preference being given to creditors in this state. The state treasurer has \$10,000 of the defunct company's funds. The Mississippi Valley Trust company of St. Louis is the creditor.

Judge Littlefield said he believed no attempt would be made in the final accounting to compute interest on deposits. It has been estimated, he said, that it would require five expert accountants to compute the affairs of the company by this method, and therefore it is impracticable.

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L. L. NUNN BRINGS SUIT OVER WATER

Pleasant Grove and Caleb Tanner, State Engineer, Are The Defendants.

TITLE IS POINT INVOLVED.

City Wants to Keep Supply for Culinary Purposes—Plaintiff Needs It For Power.

A suit was today filed in the federal court, wherein Lucien L. Nunn, manager of the Telluride Power company is plaintiff and the defendants named are Pleasant Grove City and Caleb Tanner, state engineer. The complaint sets forth that complainant is not and never has been a resident of the State of Utah. It is further alleged that on June 7, 1906, plaintiff filed an application in the office of the state engineer, to appropriate 15 cubic feet of the water of "Drove creek," Utah county, to be diverted and carried a certain distance to be used in connection with the water of Battle Creek for the generation of electric energy.

Thereafter, and within 30 days, alleges plaintiff, the city of Pleasant Grove, through its mayor, James O. Bullock, filed a protest with the engineer against the application of Mr. Nunn, setting forth that the waters of Battle Creek had already been appropriated, and because of its known helpfulness was the main source of the city for culinary purposes, that to mix with it the waters of Drove creek, impure, because of the grazing of vast herds near by, would militate greatly against the inhabitants of Drove creek, impure, because of the source mentioned for a wholesome water supply.

The complaint then goes on to state that complainant denied each and every allegation of the protesters, and asked the state engineer to grant a hearing to both sides of the controversy but that that official, taking no notice of Mr. Nunn's request, arbitrarily rejected the application. Wherefore the court is petitioned to cite before that tribunal the said defendants, to show cause why the rejection of the application should not be rescinded.
