WEATHER DURING WEEK.

Bulletin Issued Shows Low Temperature Prevailed Throughout State.

The weather buildtin for the week ending May 27, is as follows

Cool weather prevailed during the the temperature everaging Week. slightly below the normal. The distribution of the temperature deficiency tribution of the temperature deficiency over the state was quite equable. Fair warm, weather prevailed during the carly part of the week, the tempera-ture averaging considerably above nor-mal, but about the middle of the week, cold, cloudy weather set in, and con-tinued with high wind, and some scat-tered frosts. The change from the

tinued with high wind, and some scal-tered frosts. The change from the warm weather of the early part of the week to the cold of the latter part way much greater in the northern half of the state than in the southern. The precipitation was unevenly dis-tributed over the state during the week, being quite heavy over the northern half of the state, and considerably less in the southern, a few stations report-ing none. Snow was frequent in the higher districts of the northern portion, the depth ranging from one to seven inches on the morning of the 24th. This wet, heavy snow did considerable dam-age. Without exception the rail set in generally over the state on the evening of the 25th, High water was general in the streams during the warm weather early in the week, but the waters gen-erally fell during the cold weather of the latter half despite the heavy rains. To the leeward of the southern mont-tains dry weather was being prolonged. dry weather was being preand moisture was greatly needed. high winds that swept over the state generally nearly every day of the week, did some slight local damage. The percentage of the possible

The percentage of the possible amount of sunshine during the week vas below the usual amo was below the usual amount, averaging about 50 per cent. At the beginning of the week the full possible amount of sunshine prevailed throughout the state, but it decreased rapidly towards the latter part. the latter part.
