Mr. Young's training and experience, his keen wit and native humor, ought to make him an ideal editor, and the "News" trusts that the Chronicle will flourish in his hands even as the proverbial green bay tree.

Answering an inquiry on the Strawberry valley reservoir project, which the Utah delegation in Congress has been successful in having approved, the "News" will say that the enterprise was fully described with maps in an article by Prof. Swenson in the Christmas News. The project calls for the construction of a reservoir in the Strawberry valley, the running of a tunnel three miles long from the reservoir to Spanish Fork creek, after which the water will be conveyed through the natural channels to Utah lake. The stream thus secured is relied on to more than offset the water pumped from Utah lake. The project will be a wonderful boon for the farmers in Utah and Salt Lake counties, who will directly benefit all the crops they grow, especially the best crop, as it will be assured the water needed for July and August irrigation.

MUST BE EXAMINED.

Attorney General's Opinion on Physicians Coming From Other States.

Attorney-General Breeden received a query yesterday afternoon from Dr. A. S. Condon of Ogden, member of the state board of medical examiners, relative to issuing certificates to physicians licensed by other states, and answered the same as follows:

"I beg to acknowledge receipt of your favor of yesterday seeking my opinion relative to the power of the state board of medical examiners to issue certificates to physicians licensed by and coming from other states, whose requirements for certificates are as high, if not higher, than ours, and who will act reciprocally without requiring such physicians to undergo examination here. Section 1729, revised statutes of 1905 so far as material to this inquiry, reads as follows:

"The board shall have power to issue certificates to any physician who furnishes satisfactory proof of having received a degree or diploma from a chartered medical college in good standing and who shall pass a satisfactory examination before the board. The board shall issue two forms of certificates or licenses, one for persons holding such a degree or diploma who have been examined and favorably passed upon by the board, and another for persons desiring to practise obstetrics, etc."

"This provision of the statutes is clear and unambiguous and it means that before a person can be licensed by the state board of medical examiners to practise medicine in this state, such person must submit himself to the board for examination and must be examined and passed upon favorably by the board before a certificate can be legally issued to him. With these views of the law relating to the question you submit, I must reply in the negative. But as you suggest the whole subject is within the control of the Legislature and if that body deems it wise to do so, it can amend the law and permit the board to act reciprocally with other states."

President Smith and Party See
The Room in Which Book of
Mormon was Translated.

ALSO GO TO HILL CUMORAH.

Likewise Through Grove Where Joseph Received his First Vision,
And Kirtland Temple

(Special to the "News.")

Chicago, Dec. 28.—President Joseph F. Smith and party arrived in Palmyra Tuesday morning and immediately took vehicles to the Smith home in Manchester township, where they visited the room where the Book of Mormon was translated. They also went through the grove where Joseph beheld the Father and the Son in the spring of 1820. Here they sang a hymn and later repaired to the Hill Cumorah, on the summit of which President Smith offered a splendid prayer.

Returning to Palmyra the party saw the press on which the Book of Mormon was printed; also that on which the purported first sheets of the book were printed. They arrived at Cleveland Wednesday morning, leaving shortly after for Kirtland, where they spent through the Temple which they found thoroughly renovated but spiritless. The visitors were kindly received by those in charge. President Smith took occasion to visit his father's house, which is now much improved. While here the party saw many old residences, familiar to early-day members of the Church. Returning they visited the Garfield monument and arrived in Chicago this morning, whence they will go to Kenosha, Wis., to see the Bain Wagon factory by special invitation. Everybody is well and happy.
