Of the Michigan Copper companies Calu-met & Hocla paid in the ten months, \$5,000,000 or 200 per cent on its capital-isation; Quiney, \$900,000, or 28 per cent and Tamarack \$420,000, or 28 per cent. In California the Mountain Copper company paid \$1,200,000, or 19,2 per cent on its share capital. In Arizona, the United Verde (ex-Senator Clark's prop-erey) is credited with paying \$1,550,000, or 55 per cent on its capital stock, and the Arizona company \$576,429, or 18 per cent. The next largest dividend payers in the ten months were the gold mining companies, which also produced some silver and icad. In this group the lead-ers were Stration's Independence, limit-ed, of Colorado, with \$1,789,337, or 35.8 per cent on its issued capital stock, and Portland, \$750,000, or 25 per cent.
