LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

PRESIDENT YOUNG AND PARTY.—We have received the following dispatch to-day, per Deseret Telegraph line:

"SPRINGVILLE, Aug. 29.—The following is the list of the President's company going South: Presidents B. Young and A. H. Wells; Elders B. Young Jr., R. T. Burton, John R. Winder, J. W. Fox, A. E. Hinkley, Brian Stringham, D. B. Huntington, O. P. Arnold, Willard Young and A. M. Musser. President G. A. Smith; Elders A. K. Thurber and John H. Smith go with them to Nephi. Yesterday two excellent meetings were held at Provo; Presidents Joseph Young, Sen., and Brigham Young spoke in the morning and Presidents Brigham Young and G. A. Smith in the evening. General and wholesome instructions were given to large and attentive audiences. Meeting was held here last evening. There was a full house; Presidents Young, Smith and Wells and Bishop A. O. Smoot spoke. The party will dine at Santaquin to-day and will stay at Nephi to night.

Chauncey Turner, an old member of the Church, was buried yesterday at Provo.

SABBATH MEETINGS.—The congregations assembled in the Tabernacle yesterday, were addressed in the morning by Elders later returned from foreign missions and in the afternoon by Elder Orson Pratt. Elder Pratt's discourse was of a most interesting description, proving the necessity of Divine authority to authorize men to act and officiate in the ordinances of the gospel, and to establish the Church of God on the earth, and that the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints had been so empowered and established by direct revelation from Heaven.

THEATRE.—The audience at the Theatre was rather slim on Saturday evening, and not so good as the entertainment deserved. "The Huguenot Captain" was presented in good style, the characters throughout being well enacted. Mr. McKenzie as Rene de Pardillon did full justice to his part, as he always does. Mr. Margetts, as the braggart, cowardly sergeant, Annibal Leoust, was unctuous, as usual. Miss Nellie Colebrook, as the Duchess Jeanne, appeared to great advantage, and played and looked her part as if she had studied it well. We do not remember ever seeing her act with more grace and precision. Her performance was frequently applauded.

Miss Adams, (Mrs. Kiskadden) was warmly welcomed on her re-appearance, and her performance of Gabrielle was occasionally applauded.

In the farce of the Rough Diamond "Pip's" Cousin Joe kept the house alive, and would be difficult to excel. On Wednesday evening the great play of William Tell, the Hero of Switzerland, will be followed by the farce Brags vs. Plecter.

IMPORTERS.—We were informed this morning, that for the past day or two, two men, Scandinavians, have been going about the city soliciting subscriptions of the charitable to bring along the family of one of them, some seven or eight in number, whom, for want of means, he had been compelled to leave back in Omaha, where they are now staying. The men had an old, crumpled, dirty and worn out paper, on which was the signature of a well-known citizen here, who recently held a prominent position in the Scandinavian mission, and this signature was urged as proof that there was nothing spurious in their representations, intimating that any sum of money however small would be thankfully accepted. Our informant said that a few moments after hearing their rather piteous tale and seeing it responded to, he had occasion to go into one of the co-operative stores, where he saw the distressed "parent" and his companion handing out the small change to pay for clothing they were then buying. This aroused his suspicions. It will be well for people to be on their guard against operators of this kind. Such a dodge might be used to advantage here and in a genuine case, of the kind we think few of our citizens would refuse to respond to such an appeal. But we should be sorry to hear of a single instance of the benevolent being deceived upon to the extent of a cent by harpies and importers, too lazy to work for a livelihood.

HEARD FROM.—The much talked of Big Horn expedition has been heard from. Our Cheyenne exchanges state that Capt. William Wise, one of the advance party had lately arrived. His description of the success of the party is anything but flattering. The expedition is now divided into three parties: two of the division have struck out by different routes for Montana. These adventurers had to undergo a long and arduous journey, and had to pass through every kind of privation and danger. They had to travel through the mountains and through the most dangerous places. Henry McHenry, a young man who belonged to the expedition, left the company to go hunting and lost his way and wandered about until starvation caused his death. No mineral discoveries of any consequence were made by the expedition. The last prospects were found on Hiko Mountain, near the line of the U. P. R. R.

MEDICAL.—We had a call this morning from Brother S. H. Davis, who three weeks ago arrived from England. Bro. Davis desires to enter the practice of the medical profession, for which, judging by the testimonials from men eminent in the profession in his favor, and which he submitted to us, he is well qualified, and we should think would give satisfaction to a physician and surgeon. DENVER.—On the night of Tuesday last as Mr. T. H. Patton, of Denver City, stepped out of his house to the well to get a drink of water, while a bullet, within a short distance from him, accompanied by the report of a pistol. The would-be assassin was not discovered. On the 24th instant, on the streets of that city, a man named George Grover was shot upon by three Mexicans and severely beaten, and the Mexicans struck him several times over the head with an axe and after rendering him helpless the sounders robbed him of everything available and decamped. We take these particulars from the Colorado Tribune.

CASE OF STABBING.—A serious case of stabbing occurred at five o'clock yesterday (Sunday) morning, in the saloon of J. M. Simmons, on Second South Street. As far as we could learn, the following are the particulars of the affair: While John Wright, George Hagne and Richard Burke were engaged playing cards in the saloon at eleven o'clock on Saturday night, Archibald Livingston approached the party and desired to join them, when Burke made some offensive remarks, at which Livingston felt insulted. The four persons above mentioned, however, joined in play, and remained together several hours. At 3 o'clock Hagne left, and at 5, Livingston asked Burke why he had insulted him. Burke then threw off his coat and the two commenced fighting. Burke met his antagonist with a knife and stabbed him in the breast, in the head and behind the ear, at which part the knife broke. Livingston threw the other down and on top of him, and whilst down, Burke reached round and cut Livingston's clothing across the back. Burke then cried, "enough." The police were called in and arrested Burke. Livingston was taken to his residence, where Dr. Anderson and Ormsby attended to his wounds. The preliminary examination in this case came off this afternoon.

ARRESTED.—Alderman Clinton, Captain Bart, and several of the police officers, engaged in the execution of the warrant issued by the first named gentleman for the destruction of the liquor and the articles used in the unlicensed sale thereof by Mr. Engelbrecht, of Second South Street, were this morning arrested by United States Marshal Patrick, on a warrant issued by the United States Court of this district. The preliminary hearing took place at Faust's Hall this afternoon, before Judge Strickland, when Messrs. Clinton, Bart and Hyde were admitted to bail in \$10,000 each, and the rest of the officers in \$2,000 each.
