

SERIOUS GUN ACCIDENT.

EDWARD CAROTHERS SHOT AND
DANGEROUSLY WOUNDED.

We are indebted to Brother William Howard, who writes from Price River, Cañon, for the following:

Edward Carothers, a young man, working at Mr. Cordery's the camp, was accidentally shot on Tuesday, June 20th, by E. Woodward. The ball entered his back, and passing through the shoulder blade, came out just above the collar bone. A messenger was immediately sent to Char Creek, to telegraph to Provo for a doctor. Carothers was in a precarious condition, but hopes were entertained by his friends that he would live, as it was feared he was bleeding internally, as blood came out of his nose and mouth for some time after being shot.

Mr. Woodward was looking at a Winchester rifle and, stepping to the tent door, said, "I believe I will pierce those bullets' ears," alluding to a span of rails belonging to his brother that were tied to a wagon eye. He did not know there were any carriages in the magazine, as the gun had just previously been cleaned by the owner. In raising the gun Mr. Woodward pushed down the lever, which threw a cartridge into the barrel, also throwing the hammer of the gun back, but not sufficiently to catch on the dog. When the lever was lowered it caught the hammer, fell, resulting in the accident. No one appears to attach the least blame to Mr. Woodward other than for carelessness. I arrived at the scene of the accident inside of an hour and a half after it happened.

Later, Mr. Woodward felt quite easy this morning. Since I arrived here I understand Dr. Pike refused to come.

Celebration of the Fourth.—There will be a general celebration on the fourth of July, an organization having been effected between the different parties. By the understanding that has been reached, Governor Ed. H. Murray will be President of the day.

On motion, the meeting adjourned, to convene at the City Hall, at 10 a.m., Saturday, to decide upon a programme.

Pratt, who will have special charge of the eye, ear, throat, and nose department, is fully qualified for that class of cases, which are with her a specialty, although also capable to the various other branches of the profession, especially clinics and the diseases of women.

With such an array of ability and other things in proportion, the institution will undoubtedly accomplish much in ameliorating the condition of the afflicted.

The Lake.—Bathing in the Lake is now most delightful. At Black Rock and Garfield excellent accommodations are provided, the water is pleasant and invigorating, meals or regular board can be had at reasonable prices, and we are surprised that the trains are not crowded. They leave at 8:10 a.m. and 4:45 p.m. Probably the people are not aware that the bathing season is inaugurated because the company has not announced it through the News. Now the annual rush will doubtless commence. Both Garfield and Black Rock are in charge of Messrs. Hyde and Douris, who know how to cater for the public, and as the Railroad Company is now peculiarly interested in the bathing grounds, accommodations will be of a better character than ever.

It turns out, however, that they are three lambs. If so, however, how could they have subsisted for they are all alive. And how could they, in the first place, fall to such a depth without being killed? They were to be taken out of their peculiar prison yesterday.
