"Pirates of Penance."—For months past, the indefatigable Professor Smyth, the successful juvenile opera man, has been training his youthful company of singers and actors for the above named opera, which he designs producing for the first time on next Monday afternoon at the Salt Lake Theatre. It will also be played that same evening and repeated on the following night. The afternoon performance will commence at 2 o'clock, the evening performance at 8. A glance at the bill will show that the opera is excellently cast among a selection of talented juveniles. The opera is almost entirely new in this city, having been played but once by the Melville troupe, but even if it had been repeatedly presented, the charm and novelty of juvenility in the performers would remain as a strong attraction. The piece has been carefully prepared, and should be an artistic as well as a financial success. Every body should go to see it. Especially, give the children a chance on Monday afternoon.

Last Night's Lecture.—The lecture given at the Theatre last evening, by Mr. Archibald Forbes, was one which merited, though it did not receive, a bountiful patronage. This was due somewhat, no doubt, to the blunders attending which had arisen in regard to dates. The lecture entitled "Royal People I Have Known," a series of sketches of Mr. Forbes' personal history, wherein he has come in contact and formed personal intimacies with some of the world's most distinguished characters, is the one which he commenced his notable career as a war correspondent, which for ten years has been his almost incessant occupation. Prior to that time he was a dragoon in the British army. The first royal personage introduced to his audience was the Emperor William, of Germany, as he stood between Metz and Saarbrück surrounded by Von Moltke, Bismarck, and other officers of his staff, watching the magnificent army which, for two hours, streamed past—in the words of the lecturer, "the stupendous array which the German monarch had led over the Rhine to oppose the warriors of those legions over whose heads once flashed the victorious eagles of Napoleon the Great." Two weeks later was fought the terrible battle of Gravelotte. He drew a graphic picture of the bloody scene and related an amusing incident which followed, in which Gen. Phill. Sheridan, who was attached to the staff of the German Emperor, took an active part. He then described most vividly, even pathetically, the capitulation of Sedan; the arrival of the flag of truce; the Prussian artillery waiting to make a bombardment, which would have been a butchery; the shattered remnants of the French army hovering under the walls of the beleaguered city; the meeting of Louis Napoleon and Bismarck; the subsequent 20 minutes interview between the monarchs of the opposing powers in the Chateau Bellevue; and the signing of the terms of capitulation; all portrayed so graphically, so powerfully, that as he proceeded, the pictures seemed to pass like a panorama before the eyes of his listeners. In the same chateau where the capitulation papers were signed, Mr. Forbes, afterwards, was writing an account of the event to his journal, when a companion, sitting by munching a meatless lamb-bone in a vain endeavor to derive nourishment therefrom, at last gave up the ineffective labor in disgust, and flinging down the bone, accidentally split the ink bottle of his literary friend, Mr. Forbes, on visiting the Chateau some months afterwards, was shown a large patch of ink upon the floor, which he was certain came from his own bottle, but which the guide gravely told him, "and guides never lie," was accidentally split by the French monarch in his nervous excitement while signing the documents of capitulation. A great deal of what becomes history, the lecturer said, often has just such origin.

The character, habits and tastes of the East Indian princes, who seat you in a chair of solid silver, and expect you to admire upon their walls a gorgeous painting of Red Riding Hood, worth 10 cents, or a ghastly portrait of President Lincoln, dear at half a dollar, was the next subject, hastily sketched, as was one of Alphonso, the boy King of Spain; that "land of the unexpected and the impossible." The Shah of Persia, in his grand advertising march through Europe, was next caught up and scathingly criticized for his shabbiness, vanity, ostentation, impudence and fraud.

He next described his meeting with the Grand Duke Nicholas, brother to the late Czar of Russia, and commander-in-chief of the national forces. This introduction took place in a boat in the middle of the Danube, during the Russo-Turkish war. He depicted the memorable battle of Plevna, and his subsequent celebrated ride of 170 miles in 20 hours, during which he neither ate, drank nor slept, to the nearest telegraph office, where he dispatched the news of the terrific battle to his newspaper in far off England. At this place, an obscure village of Bulgaria, in a small house, he met Alexander the II of Russia, who not only applauded him on his feat of out-riding, by hours, all his peers, but what was more, bestowed on him, for distinguished personal bravery before Plevna, the grand cross of the order of Stamboul (he never exhibited the cross). He afterwards saw the Czar at St. Petersburg. He was a man of many virtues, comparatively free from the corruption by which he was surrounded, hard-working, industrious and filled with the highest aspirations for the welfare of his people. But he was, in some respects, a weak man, and encompassed by corrupt influences and traditions, felt powerless to pierce the obstacles which lay like barriers across the pathway of reform. Alexander III was a much stronger man than his father, with a strong will, no favorites and a wise wife. Whether his will and ability are to be exerted for the good or evil of Russia, will soon be made known, for he is not a man to dally long in indecision and hesitation.

King Theobald, of Burmah, Emperor of the White Elephant, Lord of the Golden Umbrella and all the rest of it, was the next character presented. This "mighty monarch," on a certain occasion made the speaker a costly present of a magnificent ruby ring, which he supposed at the time to be of great value, but to provide for his life, but subsequent to his death, when the ring was found to be a chagrin, on applying at a jeweler's store, that it was worth about \$5.

The Prince Imperial of France, with whom Mr. Forbes was quite intimate during the Zulu campaign in South Africa, was the next specimen of royalty taken up, and his personal appearance, his military career, and his untimely death were most interestingly told. head of the army for whose advancement he was a continual and arduous worker. The Prince of Wales had his family, as who had not, but he also had many quiet virtues, of which the world knew but little. He was not fond of displaying his military and political attainments, and therefore was not credited with many undoubtedly possessed. The world would never know half the good kindness of the Prince of Wales, long and dangerous illness was mentioned, and the suspense and the solitude evinced by the nation during that time were described; also the grand ceremonies of rejoicing which took place to commemorate his restoration. Previous to closing, Mr. Forbes briefly reviewed the leading characters of his lecture, and after speaking of their numerous trials, toils, anxieties and dangers, declared that, in his opinion, the life of a private citizen was more to be coveted than that of the proudest monarch in existence. If a crown were to be offered him to-morrow he should decline it without thanks. He preferred the fate of a traveling lecturer, delayed in a Minnesota snow drift, to any such precarious experience.

The lecturer was introduced by the Rev. Van Horn, chaplain of the 14th Infantry, who explained that owing to lameness, Mr. Forbes, with kind indulgence of the audience would occupy a chair during the delivery of his lecture. Mr. Forbes, therefore, after a warm greeting, took his seat and deliberately read, in a voice of no mean distinction, and with a decided English accent, his interesting dissertation on royalty. As a specimen of literature, it was grand. The language was gorgeous, while sententious, simple and intelligible. His forte is clearly not the lecture field, his delivery being faulty in several particulars; but as a vivid portrayer of things, and withal a master of the English tongue, it would be difficult to find his superior. His lecture was very impressive and instructive. For these reasons, he held his audience spellbound in almost breathless interest during the hour and a half occupied in its delivery.

To-night he will give his other lecture, entitled "Inner Life of a War Correspondent," which is certain to be even better than its predecessor.
