

TELLS WHAT AILS AMERICAN SHIPPING

Charles M. Schwab Criticizes Ruling of Interstate Commerce Commission.

CALLS IT INCOMPREHENSIBLE

Says No Same Man Will Build a Ship in San Francisco Until Labor Situation Changes.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—In an address delivered at the organization banquet of the Rotary club, a local promotion organization, Charles M. Schwab, head of the Bethlehem Steel corporation, last night, attributed the present condition of American shipping to what he termed "the incomprehensible ruling of the interstate commission," which compels transcontinental railroads to publish their divisions of freight charges with ocean carriers. Because of this ruling, he declared, it was impossible for steamers of foreign registration to quote through rates and underbid the American companies. He advised the citizens of San Francisco to protest against the ruling, and asserted that if he owned one of the lines to which he made reference, he would refuse to operate it rather than operate at a loss.

LABOR SITUATION.

Another portion of Mr. Schwab's speech was devoted to labor unions. In part he said: "Never again will any sane, conservative business man build a ship here until the labor situation has materially changed. Until this is brought about, you can accomplish nothing in the way of construction or manufacture. The cost of labor in this city is twice as much as in any of the eastern cities, not so much because of the wages paid, but because of the amount and the quality of the work performed. I lost \$3,000,000 here in one year because of the attitude of union labor and scratched it off my books as charge." "It may take a long time to realize it, but the awakening must come. Only concerted action by all the merchants involved, persistent and unremitting, will relieve the situation. Until that is done, San Francisco will not assume the position that is rightfully hers in the commercial world. And when it is done, I shall be willing to risk my dollars here with many other eastern capitalists."

BATTLESHIP UTAH.

Washington, Nov. 12.—The navy department today awarded the contract for the building of the battleship Utah to the New York Shipbuilding company of Camden, N. J.

There were four bidders on this ship, the Camden company being the lowest bidder for a vessel of a speed of twenty and three-quarter knots. Its bid was \$3,946,000. As designed, the displacement of the Utah will be about 21,825 tons.

NO CURRENCY LEGISLATION AT NEXT CONGRESS SESSION

Washington, Nov. 12.—Congressman John W. Weeks of Boston, chairman of the sub-committee on banking laws of the congressional joint currency commission, today said in the president today. He expressed the opinion when leaving the White House that there would be no currency legislation passed at the coming session of Congress, but said it was not unlikely that a bill changing the banking laws would be introduced. He believed cer-

tain changes in the national banking act, based on recommendations of the controller of the currency and experienced bankers, would be embodied in the measure. He thought the bill might not be passed at this session, but its introduction would afford time for full consideration and clear the way for its passage at the next session.
